There will also be more options from classes from departments offered that will be designated as X:WGST (cross-listed). Special Topics courses will be added as departments propose new offerings and they will be identified each term in the schedule of classes. The Director can also approve other courses; make sure to meet to discuss options if double-majoring or minoring in something else.
