Course Description:

This course is the fourth of six quarters of the Pastoral Counseling/Mental Health
Clinical Practicum. As such, it builds on all the learning tasks and skills
developments of the previous quarters with a special emphasis on human
sexuality in all its dimensions. Therapeutic sensitivities and modalities of
intervention will be addressed.

Typical Class Schedule:

1:30 to 2:45 Opening, Introduction to didactic elements of texts, themes,
2:45 to 3:30 Case Study I
3:30 to 3:45 Break
3:45 to 4:30 Case Study II
4:30 to 5:30 Wrap-up and Group Process

Course Requirements and Grading Criteria:

- 1. Attendance and Participation – 25 points**
 - a. Leadership in opening reflections - one 2-5 minute selected prayer,
reading, group interactive spiritual exercise. - 1**
 - b. Leadership in didactic presentations - one 45 minute leadership – 8**
 - c. Leadership in group process – one 45 minute leadership – 8**
(conversation regarding agenda and format for group processes will
be formed at end of each session, with consultation with instructor
welcomed during week prior to session)
 - d. Participation in didactic, case studies, and group processes – 8**

Absence and/or persistent lateness will be considered in one's grade. Each student will be expected to schedule a mid-term conversation with the instructor. The instructor will also contact and invite comments from site supervisors.

2. Two case Presentations (emphasis on case studies with implicit or explicit dimensions of human sexuality) – 25 points each

a. Written presentation – 8

Use presentation outline format (Comprehensive Pastoral-Clinical Assessment in Pastoral Counseling Student Handbook), including:

Client's history, issues, presenting problems, impact, affect, DSM4 description, flow and progress of therapy

Recommendations and treatment plan – goals of both therapist and client, benchmarks, process evaluations, changes in goals

Theoretical understandings of issues, modalities of treatment, supervision insights

Spirituality of client, spiritual resources, implications of treatment, challenges

Must be distributed to all course participants no later than noon on the Friday prior to the presentation.

Of special importance will be a description of any issues (expressed or implied) regarding sexuality, sexual orientation, gender identity, or wounds caused by the abuse or violation thereof.

b. Video, audio, or verbatim oral presentation and analysis – 9

- Video presentation, 5-10 minutes, preferred - with camera scope including both the counselor and the counselee. What's happening in the segment, how does this segment fit what preceded or followed. Include verbatim text of any dialogue that is difficult to hear.

- Audio presentation, 10-15 minutes, only allowed where counseling context does not allow video presentation.

- Verbatim. (Only allowed with special permission of the instructor), 10-20 minutes of session, describing in writing with 3 parallel columns: 1. what's being said by client, 2. what interpretations you bring to client's words within context of whole therapeutic process, 3. what's happening in your on-going reflections as a counselor (issues of transference, questions you have, insights you save until future interactions).

c. Group discussion leadership on Case Study – 8

What counsel, feedback, questions are you asking of the group?

How will you use (or not use) comments that are given?

What perspectives are you seeking from individuals whose backgrounds might be helpful in understanding case?

3. Integration Paper – 25 points

Due in instructor's mailbox no later than noon, August 17.

Late papers will not be accepted.

Approximately 10-12 pages, double-spaced, 12 point type.

Integration of therapeutic modality (your role in the therapeutic process), sexuality implications or concerns (how you understand issues involved), and spiritual/theological meaning (in-depth spiritual/theological dimensions of issues raised). This is not a case study, nor a research paper, but an integrated reflection on pastoral counseling with persons facing diverse, complex issues of human sexuality.

As academic research and/or citation is done for the paper, an annotated bibliography will be expected.

Possible topics might be: (other topics must be approved by instructor)

Counseling with spouses or partners of victims of sexual violence or abuse

Counseling with persons who are impacted by family or friends who come out as gay, lesbian, transgender, or bisexual

Counseling with male victims of sexual abuse as children

Counseling with male victims of rape, sexual violence

Counseling with female victims of sexual abuse as children

Counseling with female victims of rape, sexual violence

Counseling with victims of clergy sexual abuse

Counseling with victims of abuse or violence against their sexuality due to sexual orientation

Counseling with persons with emerging transgender awareness or struggles

Counseling with parents, families of sexual orientation minorities

Counseling with parents, families of transgender persons

Counseling with transgender values regarding gender, identity

Counseling with persons who consider forgiveness, reconciliation after abuse or violence

Counseling with of gender identity confusion

Counseling with families, friends of persons accused of pedophilia

Counseling with persons who have shame for body image, sexual stereotypes

Counseling with persons whose orientation is bisexual

Counseling with transcultural persons regarding sexual orientation, gender, sexual abuse
