Important Major Information

- Credits in Major: 65
- Minimum Major GPA: 2.00 (some scholarships may require higher)
- College of Arts and Sciences Requirements: 20 credits
 - HIST 1200, 1210 or 2310
 - Modern Language 1150, 1250, 1350 or demonstrated proficiency
- INTA Electives: 25 credits required. Can be chosen from ART, ARTD, ARTH, ARTL, MUSC, PHOT or THTR. In consultation with your academic advisor, 10 of these credits must be from a discipline other than visual art (ART) and 10 must be taken at the 3000-4000 level.
- This major is in the process of curricular change for 21-22. Work closely with your advisor to ensure you are planning the correct courses to prepare for the new curriculum beginning in Fall 2022.
- Students majoring in interdisciplinary arts may not earn a second degree or major within their specialization discipline.
- Art and art history transfer credits are subject to review which may include portfolio review, audition, exam and/or interview.
