- A max. of 30 community college credits may apply to this specialization.
- Please refer to the Course Catalog (<u>https://catalog.seattleu.edu/</u>) for a full list of approved courses that fulfill CRJS specialization electives.
- This degree will **not** prepare students for employment as a crime lab forensic scientist. The BA in Forensic Science should be chosen if you would like a stronger physical science foundation than other specializations. Students planning to seek employment as a crime lab forensic scientist or a medicolegal death investigator immediately upon graduation or to pursue a career or graduate study in forensic should complete the BS in Criminal Justice Forensic Science.
- PSYC 3030 & 3050 fulfill CRJS 3010 & 3020 for students earning a double-major in PSYC.
- If CRJS 4870 if taken for 3 credits, student may need a 2-credit general elective to reach the 180 credits required to graduate.
- [**] CRJS-4050 is a required class for students who began attending SU in 22FQ and onwards or who changed into this specialization in 22FQ and onwards. Those students only have 5 credits of specialization electives to complete. For students who had already been attending SU and had declared this specialization before 22FQ, CRJS-4050 is not a required class, and they have 10 credits of specialization electives to complete.
