Important Major Information

- Credits in Major: 55
- Minimum Major GPA: 2.00 (some scholarships may require higher)
- College of Arts and Sciences Requirements: 20 credits
 - HIST 1200, 1210 or 2310
 - Modern Language 1150, 1250*, 1350* or demonstrated proficiency
 - 30 credits in major electives. Options Include: ARTH 3430; CRJS 4050; ENGL 3720, 3730, 4220, 4230, 4720, 4730; PSYC 3600; SOCL 3120 (Only sections designated X: WGST in the remarks column of the quarterly schedule of classes), 3330; THRS 2040, 3020; WGST 2020, 3711, 3840, 3880, 4460, 4910, 4950 or 4960.
 - No more than 10 elective credits can be taken in any one discipline and no fewer than 20 elective credits need to be in upper-division 3000/4000 level courses.
 - Make sure to meet with your Faculty Advisor every quarter before registering to connect and to learn the most up-to-date information about what classes are offered next quarter, as well as get support in your academic and professional formation.
 - Special Topics courses will be added as departments propose new offerings and they will be identified each term in the schedule of classes.
