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### Top Public Safety Concerns

The top public safety concerns for the City of Seattle and Seattle Police Department's five precincts and micro-communities are reported based on quantitative results from the Seattle Public Safety Survey in response to the question "What, if any, are current public safety and security concerns in the neighborhood where you live and/or work? Select all that apply."

### Most Prominent Themes

The most prominent themes for the City of Seattle and Seattle Police Department's five precincts and micro-communities were identified from narrative comments in survey responses to questions "Do you have any additional thoughts on public safety and security issues in Seattle, generally, or your neighborhood, specifically, that you would like to share?" and "Do you have any thoughts on the Micro-Community Policing Plan Initiative that you would like to share?"

### Measures of Community Perceptions of Public Safety

The survey included question sets that make up distinct scales that measure community perceptions of police, neighborhood features, and crime as related to public safety. Results are reported for question sets measuring Police Legitimacy, Collective Efficacy-Informal Social Control, Collective Efficacy-Social Cohesion, Fear of Crime, and Social Disorganization.

## Introduction and Overview

### Seattle Police Department's Micro-Community Policing Plans

The Seattle Police Department's (SPD) Micro-Community Policing Plans (MCPP) initiative was implemented in January 2015. The SPD MCPP is based on the notion that public safety can be enhanced, and crime reduced, through collaborative police-community attention to distinctive needs of Seattle neighborhoods with focused crime control, crime prevention and quality of life strategies on neighborhood-specific priorities. The SPD MCPP recognizes that no two Seattle neighborhoods are alike and that resident perceptions of crime and public safety at the micro-community level matter. The MCPPs take a three-prong approach to bring together community engagement, crime data, and police services. MCPPs are tailored to meet the individual needs of each micro-community with a unique approach owned by the community. When used in conjunction with crime data, information gathered through community engagement to develop the MCPPs, that consider resident perceptions at the micro-community level, provide a much more accurate picture of the reality of crime and public safety than official crime data alone. This utilization of resident feedback and community perception of crime and public safety used in conjunction with official crime data to understand and address the reality of crime in communities makes the MCPP strategy unique and unprecedented. A central component of the MCPP is the annual Seattle Public Safety Survey that was first administered October 15 through November 30, 2015, and has been conducted annually since. The Seattle Public Safety Survey is independently conducted by a research team from Seattle University [Crime & Justice Research Center](#) which is part of the Department of Criminal Justice, Criminology & Forensics led by Dr. Jacqueline Helfgott (Principal Investigator) and graduate and undergraduate student research assistant/analysts who work in each of the SPD precincts. The 2025 SPD MCPP Research Analysts are Ivy Mwaura (East Precinct), Tess Harbert (North Precinct), Ella Vermeire (South Precinct), Darion Lamell (Southwest Precinct), Claire Moore (West Precinct), and Cleo McBride (Citywide).

### The 2025 Seattle Public Safety Survey

The Seattle Public Safety survey is a non-probability survey designed as part of the SPD MCPP evaluation to collect data from those who live and/or work in Seattle. The survey measures community perceptions of crime and public safety and perceptions of public safety-related quality of life elements – Police Legitimacy, Social Cohesion, Informal Social Control, Social Disorganization, and Fear of Crime at the citywide, precinct, and micro-community levels. The purpose of the survey is to collect data about what matters to residents regarding public safety, neighborhoods and communities, and the police, to better understand the priorities of residents in conjunction with official crime statistics collected by SPD and other avenues used by SPD to identify community-level public safety concerns. The 2025 survey was administered online from October 15 - November 30, 2025 and was available in 11 languages -- Amharic, Arabic, Chinese, English, Korean, Oromo, Somali, Spanish, Tagalog, Tigrinya, and Vietnamese, and administered through multiple channels including precinct-based outreach via email, media (local TV news and [The Seattle Times](#)) social media (e.g., *Nextdoor*, *Facebook*, *LinkedIn*, *X*, *Instagram/Threads*), and via paper flyers distributed in community meetings and neighborhood community centers, businesses, libraries, and other community settings and via interactive [Hello Lamp Post](#) signs that offered community members opportunity to access and ask questions about the Seattle Public Safety Survey and the MCPP with attempt to target underrepresented communities.

*Hello Lamp Post* was used in the administration of the Seattle Public Safety Survey to enhance community outreach, inclusivity, and accessibility. Hello Lamp Post is a human-centric engagement solution that makes physical places, spaces, and objects interactive using simple, text-based conversations that people interact with through signs placed on objects in the environment. Hello Lamp Post signs were posted in each of the 58 neighborhoods in Seattle during the survey administration period to provide community members access to the survey link and interactive conversation about the survey making participation a more dynamic experience. The inclusion of *Hello Lamp Post* in the survey administration outreach provides additional data on the number and nature of interactions in different neighborhoods, the questions community members have about the survey, and demographics of those who interact with the signage. Text messages, which provide the lowest barrier to entry, are a familiar form of communication for all ages, and people can use a basic mobile phone to participate. Hello Lamp Post signage provides a 24/7-365 touchpoint to provide information and services outside normal business hours with signage and communication translated into the languages prominent in the respective neighborhoods. The partnership with Hello Lamp Post will enhance survey administration by providing a cost and time efficient police-community engagement communication strategy to increase accessibility and inclusivity. *Hello Lamp Post* signs provide the ability to reach and connect with more people because of the “always on” nature of the signage and additional qualitative and quantitative data (e.g., engagement at specific locations, the sorts of questions community member ask about the survey).

## How the Seattle Public Safety Survey Results Inform the Seattle Police Micro-Community Policing Plans

The Seattle Public Safety Survey results offer SPD comprehensive data reflecting the views of residents at city, precinct, and micro-community levels to inform the SPD MCPP priorities and strategies. The specific goal of the survey is to collect data that captures citywide resident concerns about public safety, police, and neighborhoods to inform the SPD MCPPs. The survey findings supplement official crime statistics and traditional precinct-level methods of identifying community concerns (e.g., police-community meetings, ad-hoc precinct surveys) to ensure that the MCPP priorities and strategies are closely aligned with the public safety concerns of all residents within the city, precincts, and micro-communities.

## Description of Indices and Scales included in the Seattle Public Safety Survey

### Indices of Top Concerns and Prominent Themes

The top public safety concerns and the themes identified within respondents’ narrative comments (in response to the last question in the survey, “Do you have any additional thoughts on public safety and security issues in Seattle, generally, or your neighborhood, specifically, that you would like to share?”) are presented as both individual items and as those items aggregated into indices. This allows communities and law enforcement to engage in discussions about broader issues (e.g., property crime) as well as the items that may be one component of that broader issue (e.g., car prowls). At the citywide, precinct, and MCPP levels, the top indices are reported both as public safety concern indices and theme indices. The 9 public safety concern indices were conceptually identified from 72 items and are comprised of between 5 to 13 items (See Appendix). The 30 theme indices were conceptually identified from 100 individual themes and are comprised of between 1 to 15 items. All

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public safety concerns and theme results for indices and items are reported in this report's appendices for Seattle, the five precincts, and all MCPPs. This provides transparency specific to how concerns and themes rank across and within varying geographies, as well as the number of respondents connected to those geographies.

This more complex presentation of results was implemented in 2021 and required changes to the format of the presentation of results as compared to reports in prior years (2015-2020) - i.e., the inclusion of these indices and sub-items as well as changes to the label of the top concerns item "Lack of Police Capacity" to "Police Capacity" (which reflects concerns about capacity of the Seattle Police Department to address public safety) for the purpose of simplicity and consistency across the top concerns and themes. Top concerns that respondents can select are the same every year, but additional themes are added from year to year if new themes are revealed in the narrative comments to the open-ended question at the end of the survey asking respondents, *"Do you have any additional thoughts on public safety and security issues in Seattle, generally, or your neighborhood, specifically, that you would like to share?"*

To construct the public safety concern indices, the number of items in an index that a respondent identified as a public safety concern was summed and then divided by the total number of items used to create that index. This proportion represented the average number of items a respondent identified within an index. To determine which public safety concerns were most important to Seattle, a precinct, or an MCPP, the individual respondent proportions were then averaged within the varying locations in which they lived and/or worked. Indices and items with higher proportions or percentages, relative to other indices and items, are of greater concern to the survey respondents and their communities.

To construct the theme indices, the number of items in an index that were identified as themes within a respondent's comments were summed and then divided by the total number of items used to create that index. This proportion represented the average number of themes identified within a respondent's comments for an index. Respondents were not required to comment. However, 35.8% of respondents provided additional thoughts on public safety and security in Seattle. To determine which themes were most important to Seattle, a precinct, or an MCPP, the individual respondent proportions were then averaged within the varying locations in which they lived and/or worked. Averages were determined using the number of respondents who commented within a specific geography, not the number of total respondents for that geography. Theme indices and items with higher proportions or percentages, relative to other indices and items, were more frequently mentioned in respondents' comments.

## Measures of Community Perceptions of Public Safety

The Seattle Public Safety Survey includes question sets that make up five distinct scales that measure community perceptions of police, neighborhood features, and crime based on prior research on collective efficacy and aspects of communities that impact resident perceptions of public safety. These seven scales measure public safety-related quality of life elements: **Police Legitimacy, Informal Social Control, Social Cohesion, Social Disorganization, and Fear of Crime.**

## How Scale Data Can Be Used to Improve Public Safety

The scale data can be used in conjunction with the top concerns and prominent themes to better understand the nature of communities and micro-communities and their unique public safety issues. Concerns of residents within any given micro-community may differ in terms of perceptions of public safety with respect to police legitimacy, informal social control, social cohesion, fear of crime, and

social disorganization, perceptions of the SPD Micro-Community Policing Plans, and knowledge of the SPD Micro-Community Policing Plans. The survey findings on the scales can be used in conjunction with the top concerns and prominent themes at the community and micro-community levels to inform and guide law enforcement in developing priorities and to guide strategies in response to distinct community concerns providing a snapshot of the nature of the precinct as a whole and the individual micro-communities regarding resident views of aspects of communities related to public safety.

Ideally, a healthy community with positive police-community relations will have positive perception and high knowledge of the SPD MCPP, high police legitimacy, high informal social control, high social cohesion, low social disorganization, and low fear of crime. Survey findings can assist communities to target areas of improvement with respect to areas that stray from the ideal and negatively impact public safety.



### Law Enforcement Trust & Legitimacy.

Police legitimacy is an important concept relevant to public safety as it has been consistently found that law enforcement relies on police legitimacy for individuals to cooperate/comply with and support their departments. Gau (2014) defines police legitimacy as “an acceptance of the rules, laws, and precepts that define the police role in society, and a willingness to grant deference to police as a consequence of the belief that they are the authorized representatives who dutifully carry out the rules and laws that make society function smoothly” (p. 189). Police legitimacy is an important concept to public safety as it has been consistently found that law enforcement relies on police legitimacy for individuals to cooperate/comply with and support their departments (Gau, 2014; Reisig et al., 2007; Tyler, 2006; Tankebe, 2013). The questions in the Seattle Public Safety survey build on scales developed by Sunshine and Tyler (2003) as well as other research (Gau, 2014 and Reisig et al., 2007, Tyler, 2006; and Tankebe, 2013). In addition, research shows that procedural justice presents an important indicator of levels of police legitimacy within a community and thus questions related to procedural justice were included in the survey (Gau, 2014; Reisig et al., 2007). Resident’s perception of procedural justice can be informed by sources that go beyond ones’ personal experience, including experiences of friends/family, as well as the presentation of police actions in the media (Gau, 2014). The concept is operationalized by asking respondents to what extent they agree with certain

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statements when thinking about law enforcement and how they are treated. Finally, questions were included related to trust and residents perceived obligation to obey law enforcement officers. While the concept of trust is defined as “people’s beliefs that legal authorities are fair, are honest, and uphold people’s rights” (Tyler & Huo, 2002, p. 78-79), perceived obligation to obey is defined as the extent to which people feel “they should comply with directives from police officers ... irrespective of their personal feelings” (Tyler, 2006, p. 45). In the effort to assess residents’ trust and the obligation to obey, a series of questions that ask about how much respondents agree that SPD officers are honest and protect the rights of the residents, as well as whether residents should obey orders and accept decisions made by law enforcement. In the 2017 version of the survey, two additional questions were added in light of the national discourse around police-community engagement soliciting responses to a question regarding personal interactions with a Seattle police officer in the past year as well as a question asking about views of police at the local and national levels. In the 2018 version, we added a public safety concern regarding hypodermic needles.

The Seattle Public Safety Survey questions build from scales developed by other research showing that procedural justice presents an important indicator of levels of police legitimacy within a community. The concept is operationalized by asking respondents to what extent they agree with certain statements when thinking about your law enforcement agency and how they are treated. Finally, there are also questions related to trust and residents perceived obligation to obey law enforcement officers. Questions in the Seattle Public Safety Survey that measure police legitimacy scale include:

**On a scale from 0 to 100, with 0 being strongly disagree and 100 being strongly agree, to what extent do you agree with the following when thinking about the Seattle Police Department and its officers?**

- \_\_\_\_\_ Seattle police officers protect people’s basic rights in the neighborhood.
- \_\_\_\_\_ Seattle police officers are honest.
- \_\_\_\_\_ Seattle police officers do their jobs well.
- \_\_\_\_\_ Seattle police officers can be trusted to do the right thing for my neighborhood.
- \_\_\_\_\_ I am proud of Seattle police officers.

**On a scale from 0 to 100, with 0 being strongly disagree and 100 being strongly agree, to what extent do you agree with the following when thinking about the Seattle Police Department and its officers?**

- \_\_\_\_\_ I have confidence in Seattle police officers.
- \_\_\_\_\_ When a Seattle police officer issues an order, you should do what they say, even if you disagree with it.
- \_\_\_\_\_ You should accept Seattle police officers’ decisions even if you think they’re wrong.
- \_\_\_\_\_ People should do what Seattle police officers say, even when they do not like the way the police treat them.
- \_\_\_\_\_ Seattle police officers treat people with respect and dignity.

**On a scale from 0 to 100, with 0 being strongly disagree and 100 being strongly agree, to what extent do you agree with the following when thinking about the Seattle Police Department and its officers?**

- \_\_\_\_\_ Seattle police officers treat people fairly.
- \_\_\_\_\_ Seattle police officers take time to listen to people.
- \_\_\_\_\_ Seattle police officers respect citizen’s rights.
- \_\_\_\_\_ Seattle police officers treat everyone equally.
- \_\_\_\_\_ Seattle police officers make decisions based on facts and law, not personal opinions.

**On a scale from 0 to 100, with 0 being strongly disagree and 100 being strongly agree, to what extent do you agree with the following when thinking about the Seattle Police Department and its officers?**

- \_\_\_\_\_ Seattle police officers explain their decisions to people.
- \_\_\_\_\_ Seattle police officers make decisions to handle problems fairly.
- \_\_\_\_\_ Seattle police officers listen to all of the citizens involved before deciding what to do.

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### Collective Efficacy: Informal Social Control & Social Cohesion.

Collective efficacy has been defined as the connection between mutual trust and willingness to intervene for the common good. The concept is most often conceptualized as a combination of informal social control and social cohesion. Collective efficacy is “the linkage of mutual trust and the willingness to intervene for the common good that defines the neighborhood context of collective efficacy” (Sampson, Raudenbush, & Earls, 1997, p. 919). The concept is most often conceptualized as a combination of informal social control and social cohesion. Both scales, informal social control and social cohesion, are built on the work of Uchida, et al. (2014), which represents a modified version of a scale developed by Sampson, Raudenbush, & Earl (1997) and Sampson & Raudenbush (1999).

To assess resident’s willingness to react to crime and deviancy, participants were asked to indicate how likely it is that one of their neighbors would do something about specific incidences, such as break-ins, parking infractions, suspicious people hanging around, loud arguments on the street, underage drinking, juvenile spray-painting graffiti, someone being beaten/threatened in front of their house, disrespectful behavior by juveniles, juveniles skipping school, loud music/noise on their block, gun shots fired, and drug selling.

Social cohesion was assessed by asking participants to indicate to what extent they agree with specific statements about their community/neighborhood (e.g. “this neighborhood is a good area to raise children” or “people that live in my neighborhood are generally friendly”). Questions included in the survey designed to measure the construct of informal social control through resident willingness to react to a range of crime and deviancy events include:

**On a scale from 0 to 100, with 0 being very unlikely and 100 being very likely, how likely is it that someone in the neighborhood where you live and/or work would intervene if they would witness one of the following?**

- Someone is trying to break into a house/business.
- Someone is illegally parking in the street.
- Suspicious people are hanging around the neighborhood.
- People are having a loud argument in the street.
- A group of underage kids is drinking alcohol.
- Some children are spray-painting graffiti on a local building.

**On a scale from 0 to 100, with 0 being very unlikely and 100 being very likely, how likely is it that someone in the neighborhood where you live and/or work would intervene if they would witness one of the following?**

- There is a fight in front of your house/work and someone is being beaten or threatened.
- A child is showing disrespect to an adult.
- A group of neighborhood children is skipping school and hanging out on a street corner.
- Someone on your block is playing loud music.
- Someone on your block is firing a gun.
- Drugs are being sold.

Social cohesion, the second component of collective efficacy, is assessed in the survey by asking participants to indicate to what extent they agree with specific statements about their community/neighborhood:

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**On a scale from 0 to 100, with 0 being strongly disagree and 100 being strongly agree, to what extent do you agree with the following about the neighborhood where you live and/or work?**

- The neighborhood is a good area to raise children.
- People in the neighborhood are generally friendly.
- I am happy I live/work in the neighborhood.
- People in the neighborhood take care of each other.
- People in the neighborhood can be trusted.
- People in the neighborhood are willing to help each other.

**On a scale from 0 to 100, with 0 being strongly disagree and 100 being strongly agree, to what extent do you agree with the following about the neighborhood where you live and/or work?**

- The neighborhood is close-knit.
- People in the neighborhood generally don't get along with each other.
- People in the neighborhood do not share the same values.
- I regularly stop and talk with people in the neighborhood.
- I know the names of people in the neighborhood.

**On a scale from 0 to 100, with 0 being strongly disagree and 100 being strongly agree, to what extent do you agree with the following about the neighborhood where you live and/or work?**

- I share responsibility for the quality of life and safety in the neighborhood
- In the last year, I have been active in helping to improve the quality of life and safety in the neighborhood.

### Fear of Crime.

Fear of crime is central to the concept of public safety, due to the argument that fear of crime can have a negative impact not only on the individual but also on communities. Fear of crime can influence residents' behaviors and movements, economics, and social life and can be seen as a "key quality of life" issue (Cordner 2010). It is also important to understand that the effects of fear of crime can outweigh the effects of actual crime on individuals and communities (Warr, 2000). The items utilized in the survey mirror the fear of crime scale developed by Gray, Jackson, & Farrell (2008), which was built on the work of Farrall and Gadd (2004). To get a better understanding of residents' level of fear of crime participants are asked how worried they have been in the last year about specific crimes in their neighborhood.

In the 2015 Seattle Public Safety Survey, Fear of Crime was measured without separating in terms of fear of crime during the day and night. In the 2017 survey, two identical questions were included with the distinction of fear of crime during the nighttime and daytime. Table 4 shows question items included to measure fear of crime:

**On a scale from 0 to 100, with 0 being never and 100 being all the time, how often have you worried about the following in the neighborhood where you live and/or work during the daytime?**

- Somebody breaking into your home/work and stealing or damaging things?
- Somebody stealing your vehicle, things from or off it, or damaging it?
- Somebody stealing from you in a public space?
- You or somebody you know being sexually assaulted?
- You or somebody you know being physically attacked?

**On a scale from 0 to 100, with 0 being never and 100 being all the time, how often have you worried about the following in the neighborhood where you live and/or work during the nighttime?**

- Somebody breaking into your home/work and stealing or damaging things?
- Somebody stealing your vehicle, things from or off it, or damaging it?
- Somebody stealing from you in a public space?
- You or somebody you know being sexually assaulted?
- You or somebody you know being physically attacked?

## Social Disorganization.

To gain a better understanding about the social stability and order of the community the concept of social disorganization, which is argued to be capable in predicting crime, was included in the survey. The classical measures of social disorganization (e.g., residents' socioeconomic status and ethnic heterogeneity) can be assessed through demographic questions (Shaw & McKay, 1942; Sampson & Groves, 1989). These measures can be augmented with questions regarding the perceived level of social disorder and the perceived level of physical disorder, which are also included to assess to what degree certain signs of disorder are a matter of concern to your community (Weisburd et al., 2012; Steenbeek & Hipp, 2011). Questions included in the survey to measure social disorganization include:

**On a scale from 0 to 100, with 0 being never and 100 being all the time, how often are the following a problem in the neighborhood where you live and/or work?**

- \_\_\_\_\_ Fights on the street/threatening behavior
- \_\_\_\_\_ People loitering or being disorderly
- \_\_\_\_\_ Public alcohol/drug consumption
- \_\_\_\_\_ Public urination or defecation
- \_\_\_\_\_ Panhandling
- \_\_\_\_\_ Vandalism

**On a scale from 0 to 100, with 0 being never and 100 being all the time, how often are the following a problem in the neighborhood where you live and/or work?**

- \_\_\_\_\_ Noise late at night/early in the morning
- \_\_\_\_\_ Gambling in the street
- \_\_\_\_\_ Drug sales
- \_\_\_\_\_ Illegal sex work
- \_\_\_\_\_ People being bothered on the street

**On a scale from 0 to 100, with 0 being never and 100 being all the time, how often are the following a problem in the neighborhood where you live and/or work?**

## Seattle - Citywide Survey Results

### Seattle Citywide Survey Results Overview

Results are presented from 8,957 completed survey responses from community members who indicated they live and/or work in the City of Seattle. Compared to Seattle demographics, survey respondents were disproportionately more likely to be non-minority and female. Quantitative responses were weighted based on gender and race/ethnicity to better represent the Seattle population. Of the total 8,957 citywide responses (Unweighted N=8,707), 1,850 respondents offered narrative comments. Narrative comments were analyzed for themes and indices.

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## Summary of Findings Citywide

The top public safety concerns are Traffic Safety, Community Capacity, Police Capacity, Property Crime, and Homelessness. The most prominent themes residents in the city of Seattle commented on in their narrative responses are Traffic Safety, Public Order Crime, Fear of Crime, Property Crime, and Laws/Policy/Accountability.

On the scales measuring aspects of micro-community public safety, citywide scale ratings show low-moderate Police Legitimacy (38.7), moderate Social Cohesion (59.2), low-moderate Informal Social Control (49.3), low Social Disorganization (30.9), and low Fear of Crime (Overall – 30.2 Day – 19.2, Night – 41.1).

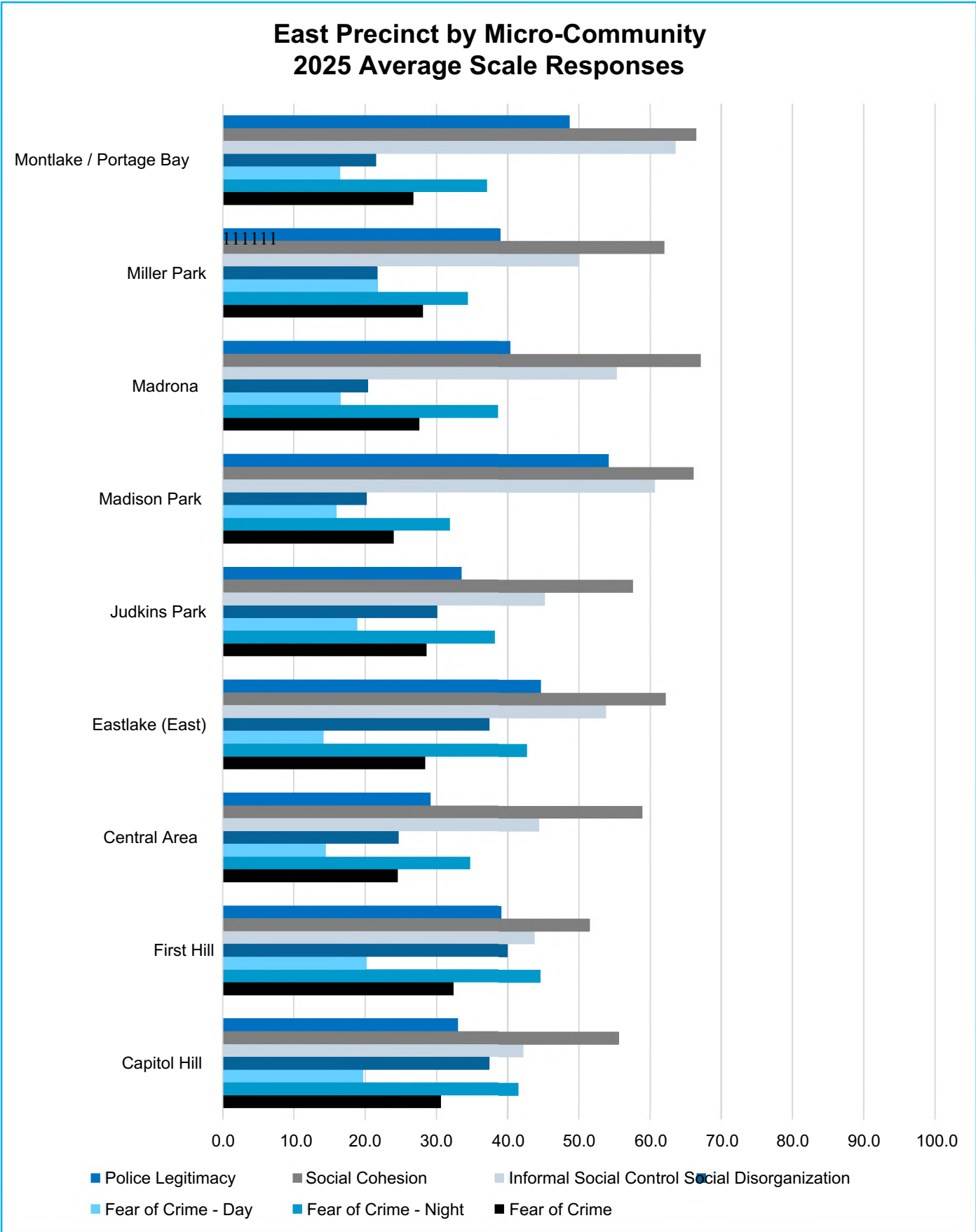


## Summary of Findings for East Precinct

The top public safety concerns indices for the East Precinct are Traffic Safety, Public Safety Capacity, Police Capacity, Property Crime, Homelessness. In comparison with the top public safety concerns Citywide, residents in the East Precinct shared four of the same public safety concerns. The most prominent theme indices residents in the East Precinct commented on in their narrative responses were Traffic Safety, Fear of Crime, Public Order Crime, Homelessness, and Laws/Policy/Accountability. In comparison with the citywide theme indices, four thematic differences emerged between the two. Compared to the citywide narrative theme indices, four thematic differences emerged, indicating some variation in how residents frame and interpret safety concerns at the precinct level. At the micro-community level, however, Traffic Safety consistently ranked as the top concern across all communities, surpassing other categories of concern in each community.

The scale results measuring community perceptions of public safety suggest that the East Precinct ranks lower in five out of six categories than the scale results Citywide with scale ratings of low-moderate (33.2) Police Legitimacy, high-moderate (57.2) Social Cohesion, low-moderate (45.1) Informal Social Control, low-moderate (32.6) Social Disorganization, and low-moderate (28.8) Fear of Crime (17.7 - Day, 39.9 - Night). The findings on the scale items for East Precinct show that the average scale rating for East Precinct on Police Legitimacy of 33.2 is 5.6 points lower than the Citywide average rating of 38.8 on this scale item. The East precinct average scale rating for Social Cohesion is 57.2, which is 2.0 points lower than the Citywide average of 59.2 The East average scale rating for Informal Social Control is 45.1, which is 4.2 points lower than the Citywide average scale rating of 49.3. The findings on the scale items for East Precinct show that the average scale rating for Social Disorganization is 32.6, which is 2.5 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 35.1 on this scale item. The Fear of Crime – Day average scale rating for the East Precinct of 17.7 is 1.5 less than the Citywide average rating of 19.2. The Fear of Crime – Night average scale rating for the East Precinct of 39.9 is 1.5 lower than the Citywide average rating of 41.4. Lastly, the Fear of Crime average scale rating for the East Precinct of 28.8 is 7.9 lower than the Citywide average rating of 36.7. On the item asking respondents to rate their views of SPD versus police nationwide, the findings for the East Precinct show that the rating for Seattle Specifically of 43.8 is 2.2 points higher than the Citywide rating of 41.6 for Seattle specifically and 2.3 points lower than the Citywide rating of 46.1 for the United States generally.

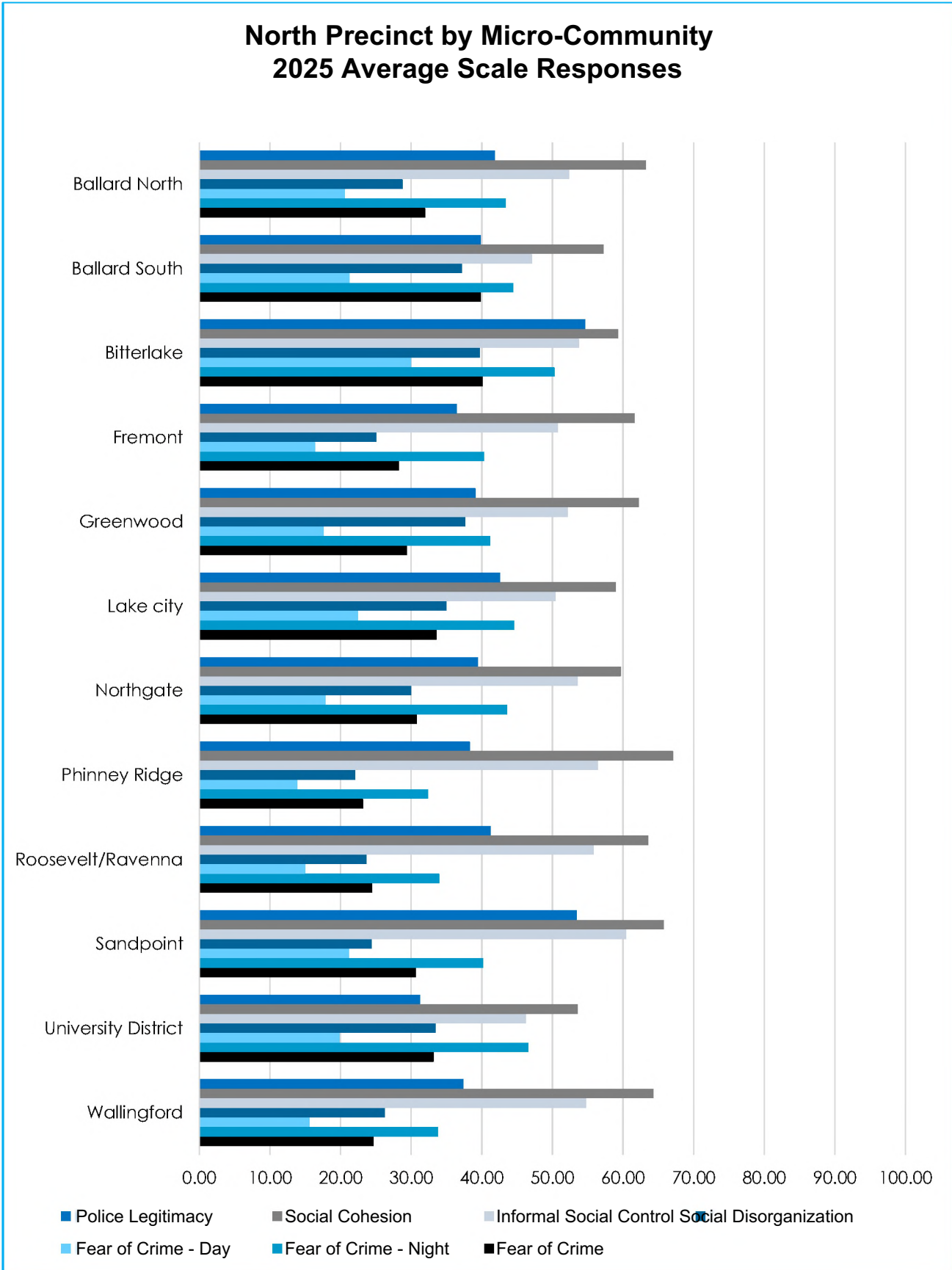
## Summary of Findings for North Precinct

The top public safety concerns for the North Precinct in 2025 are Traffic Safety, Community and Public Safety Capacity, Police Capacity, Homelessness, and Property Crime. These mirror those reported at the Citywide level, where the top public safety concerns were also Traffic Safety, Community and Public Safety Capacity, Police Capacity, Property Crime, and Homelessness. Additionally, the most prominent Citywide themes, as noted in the narrative comments of respondents, were Traffic Safety, Public Order Crime, Fear of Crime, Property Crime, and Laws/Policy/Accountability. The most prominent themes reported in 2025 in the North Precinct were like those reported at the Citywide level: Traffic Safety, Public Order Crime, Property Crime, Fear of Crime, and Laws/Policy/Accountability. At the micro-community level, top public safety concerns, prominent themes, and perceptions of public safety differ slightly from the precinct in some micro-communities (e.g., Gun Violence as a theme in Greenwood and Violent Crime in Lake City).

The results on the scales measuring community perceptions of public safety (1-100) suggest that the North Precinct scale ratings show moderate-low (38.6) Police Legitimacy, moderate-high (60.6) Social Cohesion, moderate (52.0) Informal Social control, low (29.9) Social Disorganization, and moderate-low (29.6) Fear of Crime (18.2 - Day, 41.1- Night). At the micro-community level, results on the scales differ depending on the micro-community, with some like the North Precinct as a whole (e.g., Northgate and Wallingford), while others differ (e.g., lower Fear of Crime – Night in Phinney Ridge and higher Police Legitimacy in Sandpoint), reflecting heterogeneous features of the micro-communities on measures of community perception of public safety within the precinct.

The findings on the scale items for North Precinct show that the average scale rating for North Precinct on Police Legitimacy of 38.6 is 0.2 points lower than the Citywide average rating of 38.8 on this scale item. This is a decrease of 6.8 points from the North Precinct in 2024 (45.4). Police legitimacy ratings also range from 31.3 in University District to 53.3 in Sandpoint. The North precinct average scale rating for Social Cohesion is 60.6, which is 1.4 points higher than the Citywide average of 59.2. The North average scale rating for Informal Social Control is 52.0, which is 2.7 points higher than the Citywide average scale rating of 49.3. The findings on the scale items for North Precinct show that the average scale rating for Social Disorganization is 29.9, which is 5.2 points lower than the Citywide average rating of 35.1 on this scale item. The Fear of Crime – Day average scale rating for the North Precinct of 18.2 is 1.0 point more than the Citywide average rating of 19.2. The Fear of Crime – Night average scale rating for the North Precinct of 41.1 is the same as the Citywide average rating of 41.1. Lastly, the Fear of Crime average scale rating for the North Precinct of 29.6 is 7.1 points less than the Citywide average rating of 36.7.

Finally, on the item asking respondents to rate their views of SPD versus police nationwide, the findings for the North Precinct show that the rating for Seattle Specifically of 46.9 is 5.3 points higher than the Citywide rating of 41.6. When asking respondents to rate their views of the police generally, the average response for the North Precinct was 44.1, 2 points lower than the Citywide rating of 46.1 for the United States generally.

## Summary of Findings for South Precinct

The top public safety concerns for the South Precinct are Traffic Safety, Community & Public Safety Capacity, Police Capacity, Property Crime and Homelessness. South Precinct shared the same top concerns as Citywide. For residents in the South Precinct, Community Capacity rose over Homelessness and Property Crime. The most prominent themes citizens in the South Precinct included in their narrative responses were Traffic Safety, Crime – Gun Violence, Public Order Crime, Fear of Crime and Property Capacity. In comparison, the themes most noted by residents Citywide were Traffic Safety, Public Order, Fear of Crime, Property Crime and Laws/Policy/Accountability. At the micro-community level, top public safety concerns, prominent themes, and perceptions of public safety are like the precinct. At this level of analysis, Traffic Safety emerged as the primary concern across nearly all micro-communities, apart from Claremont/Rainier Vista, where the top concern was centered on police capacity.

The results on scales measuring community perceptions of public safety in the South Precinct shows scale ratings of low-moderate Police Legitimacy (38.0), high-moderate Social Cohesion (61.0), high-moderate Informal Social Control (48.5), low-moderate Social Disorganization (29.2) and low-moderate (30.3) Fear of Crime (21.0 – Day, 39.6 – Night). At the micro-community level, results on the scales are different depending on the micro-community with some very similar to the South Precinct as a whole (e.g., Hillman City) while others show differences (e.g., SODO) reflecting heterogeneous micro-communities on measure of community perception of public safety within the precinct. The findings on the scale items for South Precinct show that the average scale rating for South Precinct on Police Legitimacy of 38.0 is 0.7 points lower than the Citywide average rating of 38.7. The South Precinct average scale rating for Social Cohesion is 61.0 which is 1.8 points higher than the Citywide which is 59.2. The South average scale rating for Informal Social Control is 48.5 which is 0.8 points lower than the Citywide average scale rating of 49.3. The findings on the scale items for South Precinct show that the average scale rating for Social Disorganization is 29.2 which is 1.7 points lower than the Citywide average rating of 30.9 on this scale item. The Fear of Crime – Day average scale rating for the South Precinct of 21.0 which is 1.8 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 19.2. The Fear of Crime – Night average scale rating for the South Precinct of 39.6 which is 1.5 points lower than the Citywide average rating of 41.1. Lastly, the Fear of Crime average scale rating for the South Precinct of 30.3 is 0.1 higher than the Citywide average rating of 30.2. On the item asking respondents to rate their views of SPD versus police nationwide, the findings for the South Precinct of 42.2 is 0.6 points higher than the citywide ranking of 41.6 for SPD specifically. For police in the United States generally, the South Precinct had an average response of 40.8 which is 5.3 points lower than the citywide rating of 46.1.

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### Summary of Findings for Southwest Precinct

The top public safety concerns for the Southwest Precinct are Police Capacity, Traffic Safety, Property Crime, Homelessness and Community Capacity. These concerns matched the top public safety concerns citywide. In the Southwest Precinct, Police Capacity and Property crime rose over Community Capacity compared to Citywide, with the two sharing Traffic safety as the highest concern. The most prominent themes residents in the Southwest Precinct commented on in their narrative responses were Traffic Safety, Public Order Crime, Property Crime, Gun Violence and Police Capacity which were consistent with the Citywide top narrative themes. At the micro-community level, top public safety concerns, prominent themes, and perceptions of public safety are like the precinct. However, some micro-communities differ from the others (e.g., Community Capacity as a top theme in Commercial Duwamish did not show up in other micro-communities' top themes).

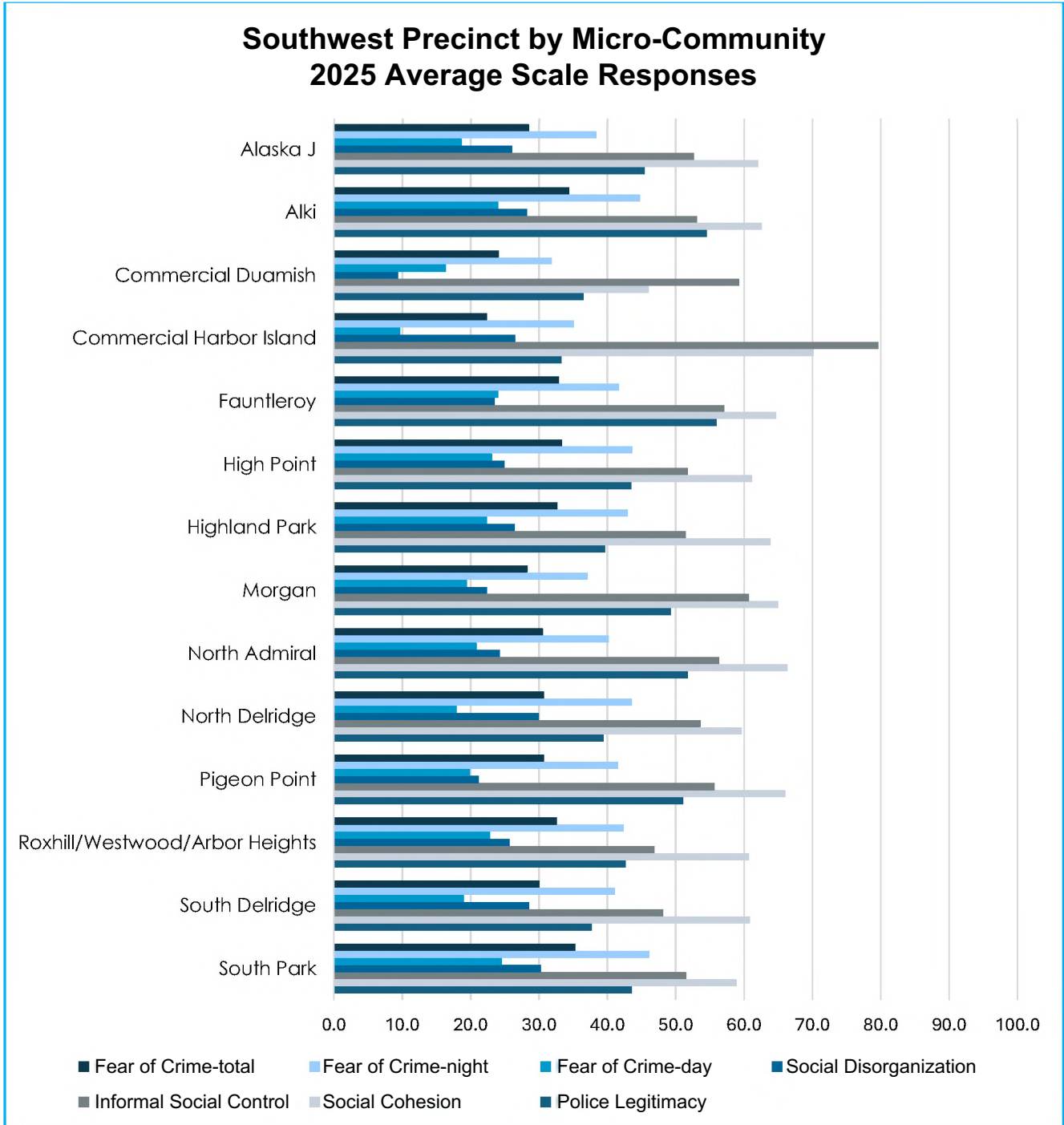
The results on the scales measuring community perceptions of public safety show that the Southwest Precinct shows scale rating of moderate (47.7) Police Legitimacy, high-moderate (62.8) Social Cohesion, moderate (53.2) Informal Social Control, low (25.8) Social Disorganization and low-moderate (31.7) Fear of Crime (21.7 Day, 41.7– Night). At the micro-community level, results on the scales are different depending on the micro-community with some very similar to the Southwest precinct as a whole (e.g., Alaska Junction) while others differ (e.g., Commercial Duwamish), reflecting heterogeneous micro-communities on measures of community perception of public safety within the precinct.

The findings on the scale items for Southwest Precinct show that the average scale rating for Southwest Precinct on Police Legitimacy 47 is 8.2 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 38.8 on this scale item. The Southwest precinct average scale rating for Social Cohesion is 62.8, which is 6.2 points higher than the Citywide average of 59.2. The Southwest average scale rating for Informal Social Control is 53.2 which is 3.9 points higher than the Citywide average scale rating of 49.3. The findings on the scale items for Southwest Precinct show that the average scale rating for Social Disorganization is 25.5, which is 9.3 points lower than the Citywide average scale rating of 35.1. The fear of Crime – Day average scale rating for the Southwest Precinct of 21.1 is 2.5 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 19.2. The Fear of Crime – Night average scale rating for the Southwest Precinct of 41.7 is 0.6 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 44.1. Lastly, the Fear of Crime average scale rating for the Southwest Precinct of 31.7 is 5 points lower than the Citywide average

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rating of 36.7. On the item asking respondents to rate their views of SPD versus police nationwide, the findings for the Southwest Precinct show that the rating of SPD specifically of 45.624 which was 3.543 points higher than the Citywide rating of 41.624. The Southwest rating of police in the United States generally was 50.77 which is 4.676 points higher than the Citywide rating of 46.676 for the United States generally.

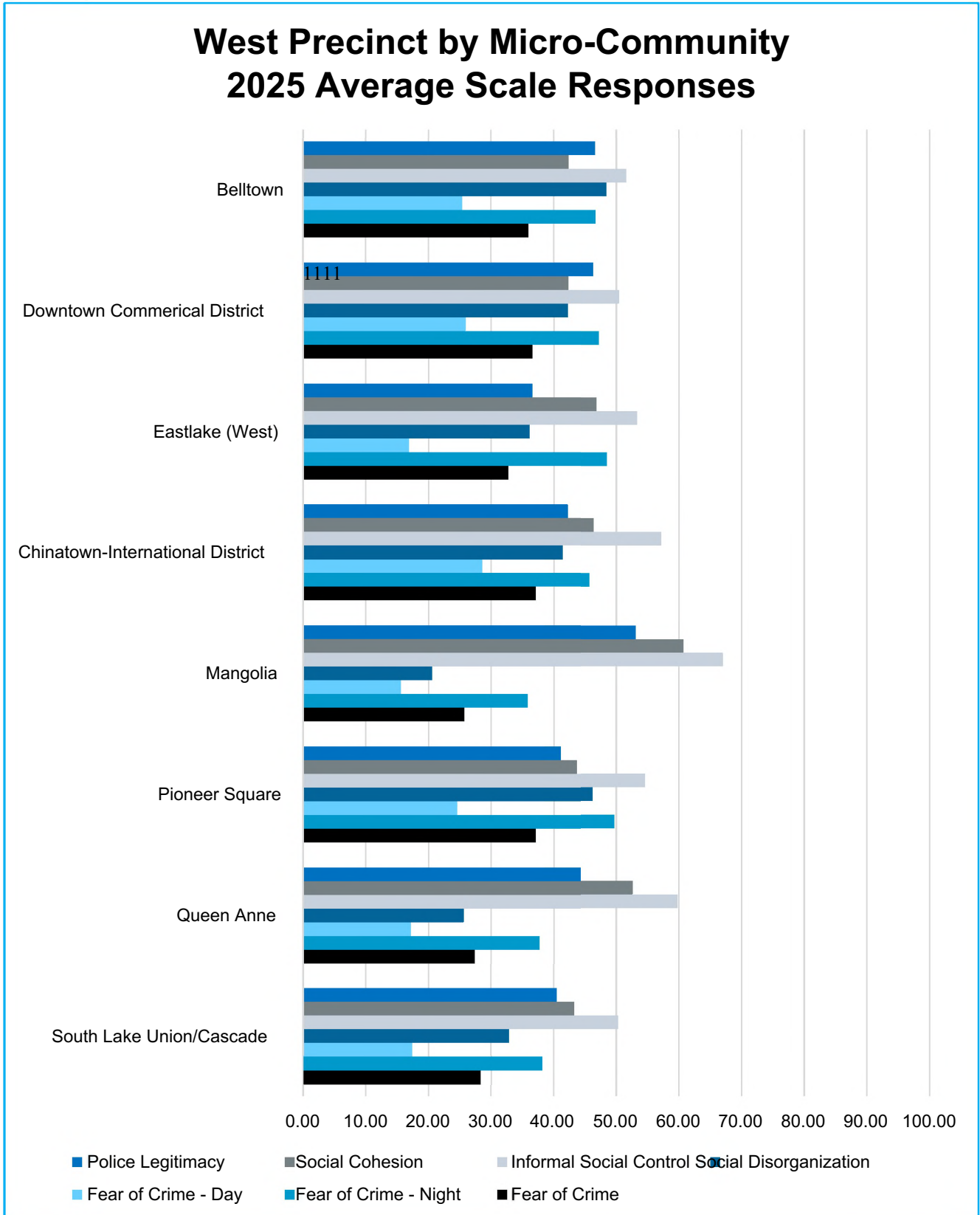
The top public safety concerns for the West Precinct are Community Capacity, Traffic Safety, Public Order Crime, Homelessness, Property Crime. These concerns are like the top public safety concerns Citywide which were Traffic Safety, Community Capacity, Police Capacity, Property Crime, and Homelessness. While they share most of the same concerns, for residents in the West Precinct concerns surrounding Public Order Crime were greater than Police Capacity. The most prominent themes residents in the West Precinct commented on in their narrative responses are Police Capacity, Traffic Safety, Public Order Crime, Laws/Policy/Accountability, and Drug Activity. At the micro-community level, top public safety concerns, prominent themes, and perceptions of public safety are quite similar from the precinct. Community Capacity is listed as the top concern in the West Precinct, as is listed as the top concern in Belltown, Downtown, and Queen Anne.

The results on the scales measuring community perceptions of public safety also suggest that the West Precinct shows similarity to the scale results citywide with scale ratings of low-moderate (41.7) Police Legitimacy, moderate (55.1) Social Cohesion, moderate (47) Informal Social Control, low-moderate (36) Social Disorganization, and low-moderate (31.9) Fear of Crime (20.6-Day, 43.2-Night). The findings on the scale items for West Precinct show that the average scale rating for West Precinct on Police Legitimacy of 41.7 is 2.9 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 38.8 on this scale item. The West precinct average scale rating for Social Cohesion is 55.1 which is 4.1 points lower than the Citywide average of 59.2. The West average scale rating for Informal Social Control is 47 which is 2.3 points lower than the Citywide average scale rating of 49.3. The findings on the scale items for West Precinct show that the average scale rating for Social Disorganization is 36, which is 0.9 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 35.1 on this scale item. The Fear of Crime – Day average scale rating for the West Precinct of 20.6 is 1.4 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 19.2. The Fear of Crime – Night average scale rating for the West Precinct of 43.2 is 2.1 higher points than the Citywide average rating of 41.1. Lastly, the Fear of Crime average scale rating for the West Precinct of 31.9 is 4.8 points lower than the Citywide average rating of 36.7. On the item asking respondents to rate their views of SPD versus police nationwide, the findings for the West Precinct show that the rating for Seattle Specifically of 48.3 is 6.7 points higher than the Citywide rating of 41.6 for

The top public safety concerns are Traffic Safety, Community Capacity, Police Capacity, Property Crime, and Homelessness. The most prominent themes residents in the city of Seattle commented on in their narrative responses are Traffic Safety, Public Order Crime, Fear of Crime, Property Crime, and Laws/Police/Accountability. On the scales measuring aspects of micro-community public safety, citywide scale ratings show low-moderate Police Legitimacy (38.7), moderate Social Cohesion (59.2), low-moderate Informal Social Control (49.3), low Social Disorganization (30.9), and low Fear of Crime (Overall – 30.2 Day – 19.2, Night – 41.1).

The top public safety concerns indices for the East Precinct are Traffic Safety, Public Safety Capacity, Police Capacity, Property Crime, Homelessness. In comparison with the top public safety concerns Citywide, residents in the East Precinct shared four of the same public safety concerns. The most prominent theme indices residents in the East Precinct commented on in their narrative responses were Traffic Safety, Fear of Crime, Public Order Crime, Homelessness, and Laws/Policy/Accountability. In comparison with the citywide theme indices, four thematic differences emerged between the two. Compared to the citywide narrative theme indices, four thematic differences emerged, indicating some variation in how residents frame and interpret safety concerns at the precinct level. At the micro-community level, however, Traffic Safety consistently ranked as the top concern across all communities, surpassing other categories of concern in each community.

The scale results measuring community perceptions of public safety suggest that the East Precinct ranks lower in five out of six categories than the scale results Citywide with scale ratings of low-moderate (33.2) Police Legitimacy, high-moderate (57.2) Social Cohesion, low-moderate (45.1) Informal Social Control, low-moderate (32.6) Social Disorganization, and low-moderate (28.8) Fear of Crime (17.7 - Day, 39.9 - Night). The findings on the scale items for East Precinct show that the average scale rating for East Precinct on Police Legitimacy of 33.2 is 5.6 points lower than the Citywide average rating of 38.8 on this scale item. The East precinct average scale rating for Social Cohesion is 57.2, which is 2.0 points lower than the Citywide average of 59.2 The East average scale rating for Informal Social Control is 45.1, which is 4.2 points lower than the Citywide average scale rating of 49.3. The findings on the scale items for East Precinct show that the average scale rating for Social Disorganization is 32.6, which is 2.5 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 35.1 on this scale item. The Fear of Crime – Day average scale rating for the East Precinct of 17.7 is 1.5 less than the Citywide average rating of 19.2. The Fear of Crime – Night average scale rating for the East Precinct of 39.9 is 1.5 lower than the Citywide average rating of 41.4. Lastly, the Fear of Crime average scale rating for the East Precinct of 28.8 is 7.9 lower than the Citywide average rating of 36.7. On the item asking respondents to rate their views of SPD versus police nationwide, the findings for the East Precinct show that the rating for Seattle Specifically of 43.8 is 2.2 points higher than the Citywide rating of 41.6 for Seattle specifically and 2.3 points lower than the Citywide rating of 46.1 for the United States generally.

Next, the top public safety concerns for the North Precinct in 2025 are Traffic Safety, Community and Public Safety Capacity, Police Capacity, Homelessness, and Property Crime. These mirror those reported at the Citywide level, where the top public safety concerns were also Traffic Safety,

Community and Public Safety Capacity, Police Capacity, Property Crime, and Homelessness. Additionally, the most prominent Citywide themes, as noted in the narrative comments of respondents, were Traffic Safety, Public Order Crime, Fear of Crime, Property Crime, and Laws/Policy/Accountability. The most prominent themes reported in 2025 in the North Precinct were like those reported at the Citywide level: Traffic Safety, Public Order Crime, Property Crime, Fear of Crime, and Laws/Policy/Accountability. At the micro-community level, top public safety concerns, prominent themes, and perceptions of public safety differ slightly from the precinct in some micro-communities (e.g., Gun Violence as a theme in Greenwood and Violent Crime in Lake City).

The results on the scales measuring community perceptions of public safety (1-100) suggest that the North Precinct scale ratings show moderate-low (38.6) Police Legitimacy, moderate-high (60.6) Social Cohesion, moderate (52.0) Informal Social control, low (29.9) Social Disorganization, and moderate-low (29.6) Fear of Crime (18.2 - Day, 41.1- Night). At the micro-community level, results on the scales differ depending on the micro-community, with some like the North Precinct as a whole (e.g., Northgate and Wallingford), while others differ (e.g., lower Fear of Crime – Night in Phinney Ridge and higher Police Legitimacy in Sandpoint), reflecting heterogeneous features of the micro-communities on measures of community perception of public safety within the precinct. The findings on the scale items for North Precinct show that the average scale rating for North Precinct on Police Legitimacy of 38.6 is 0.2 points lower than the Citywide average rating of 38.8 on this scale item. This is a decrease of 6.8 points from the North Precinct in 2024 (45.4). Police legitimacy ratings also range from 31.3 in University District to 53.3 in Sandpoint. The North precinct average scale rating for Social Cohesion is 60.6, which is 1.4 points higher than the Citywide average of 59.2. The North average scale rating for Informal Social Control is 52.0, which is 2.7 points higher than the Citywide average scale rating of 49.3. The findings on the scale items for North Precinct show that the average scale rating for Social Disorganization is 29.9, which is 5.2 points lower than the Citywide average rating of 35.1 on this scale item. The Fear of Crime – Day average scale rating for the North Precinct of 18.2 is 1.0 point more than the Citywide average rating of 19.2. The Fear of Crime – Night average scale rating for the North Precinct of 41.1 is the same as the Citywide average rating of 41.1. Lastly, the Fear of Crime average scale rating for the North Precinct of 29.6 is 7.1 points less than the Citywide average rating of 36.7.

Then, on the item asking respondents to rate their views of SPD versus police nationwide, the findings for the North Precinct show that the rating for Seattle Specifically of 46.9 is 5.3 points higher than the Citywide rating of 41.6. When asking respondents to rate their views of the police generally, the average response for the North Precinct was 44.1, 2 points lower than the Citywide rating of 46.1 for the United States generally.

The top public safety concerns for the South Precinct are Traffic Safety, Community & Public Safety Capacity, Police Capacity, Property Crime and Homelessness. South Precinct shared the same top concerns as Citywide. For residents in the South Precinct, Community Capacity rose over Homelessness and Property Crime. The most prominent themes citizens in the South Precinct included in their narrative responses were Traffic Safety, Crime – Gun Violence, Public Order Crime, Fear of Crime and Property Capacity. In comparison, the themes most noted by residents Citywide were Traffic Safety, Public Order, Fear of Crime, Property Crime and Laws/Policy/Accountability. At the micro-community level, top public safety concerns, prominent themes, and perceptions of public safety are like the precinct. At this level of analysis, Traffic Safety emerged as the primary concern across nearly all micro-communities, apart from Claremont/Rainier Vista, where the top concern was centered on police capacity.

The results on scales measuring community perceptions of public safety in the South Precinct shows scale ratings of low-moderate Police Legitimacy (38.0), high-moderate Social Cohesion (61.0), high-moderate Informal Social Control (48.5), low-moderate Social Disorganization (29.2) and low-moderate (30.3) Fear of Crime (21.0 – Day, 39.6 – Night). At the micro-community level, results on the scales are different depending on the micro-community with some very similar to the South Precinct as a whole (e.g., Hillman City) while others show differences (e.g., SODO) reflecting heterogeneous micro-communities on measure of community perception of public safety within the precinct. The findings on the scale items for South Precinct show that the average scale rating for South Precinct on Police Legitimacy of 38.0 is 0.7 points lower than the Citywide average rating of 38.7. The South Precinct average scale rating for Social Cohesion is 61.0 which is 1.8 points higher than the Citywide which is 59.2. The South average scale rating for Informal Social Control is 48.5 which is 0.8 points lower than the Citywide average scale rating of 49.3. The findings on the scale items for South Precinct show that the average scale rating for Social Disorganization is 29.2 which is 1.7 points lower than the Citywide average rating of 30.9 on this scale item. The Fear of Crime – Day average scale rating for the South Precinct of 21.0 which is 1.8 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 19.2. The Fear of Crime – Night average scale rating for the South Precinct of 39.6 which is 1.5 points lower than the Citywide average rating of 41.1. Lastly, the Fear of Crime average scale rating for the South Precinct of 30.3 is 0.1 higher than the Citywide average rating of 30.2. On the item asking respondents to rate their views of SPD versus police nationwide, the findings for the South Precinct of 42.2 is 0.6 points higher than the citywide ranking of 41.6 for SPD specifically. For police in the United States generally, the South Precinct had an average response of 40.8 which is 5.3 points lower than the citywide rating of 46.1.

The top public safety concerns for the Southwest Precinct are Police Capacity, Traffic Safety, Property Crime, Homelessness and Community Capacity. These concerns matched the top public safety concerns citywide. In the Southwest Precinct, Police Capacity and Property crime rose over Community Capacity compared to Citywide, with the two sharing Traffic safety as the highest concern. The most prominent themes residents in the Southwest Precinct commented on in their narrative responses were Traffic Safety, Public Order Crime, Property Crime, Gun Violence and Police Capacity which were consistent with the Citywide top narrative themes. At the micro-community level, top public safety concerns, prominent themes, and perceptions of public safety are like the precinct. However, some micro-communities differ from the others (e.g., Community Capacity as a top theme in Commercial Duwamish did not show up in other micro-communities' top themes).

The results on the scales measuring community perceptions of public safety show that the Southwest Precinct shows scale rating of moderate (47.7) Police Legitimacy, high-moderate (62.8) Social Cohesion, moderate (53.2) Informal Social Control, low (25.8) Social Disorganization and low-moderate (31.7) Fear of Crime (21.7 Day, 41.7– Night). At the micro-community level, results on the scales are different depending on the micro-community with some very similar to the Southwest precinct as a whole (e.g., Alaska Junction) while others differ (e.g., Commercial Duwamish), reflecting heterogeneous micro-communities on measures of community perception of public safety within the precinct.

The findings on the scale items for Southwest Precinct show that the average scale rating for Southwest Precinct on Police Legitimacy 47 is 8.2 points higher than the Citywide average rating of

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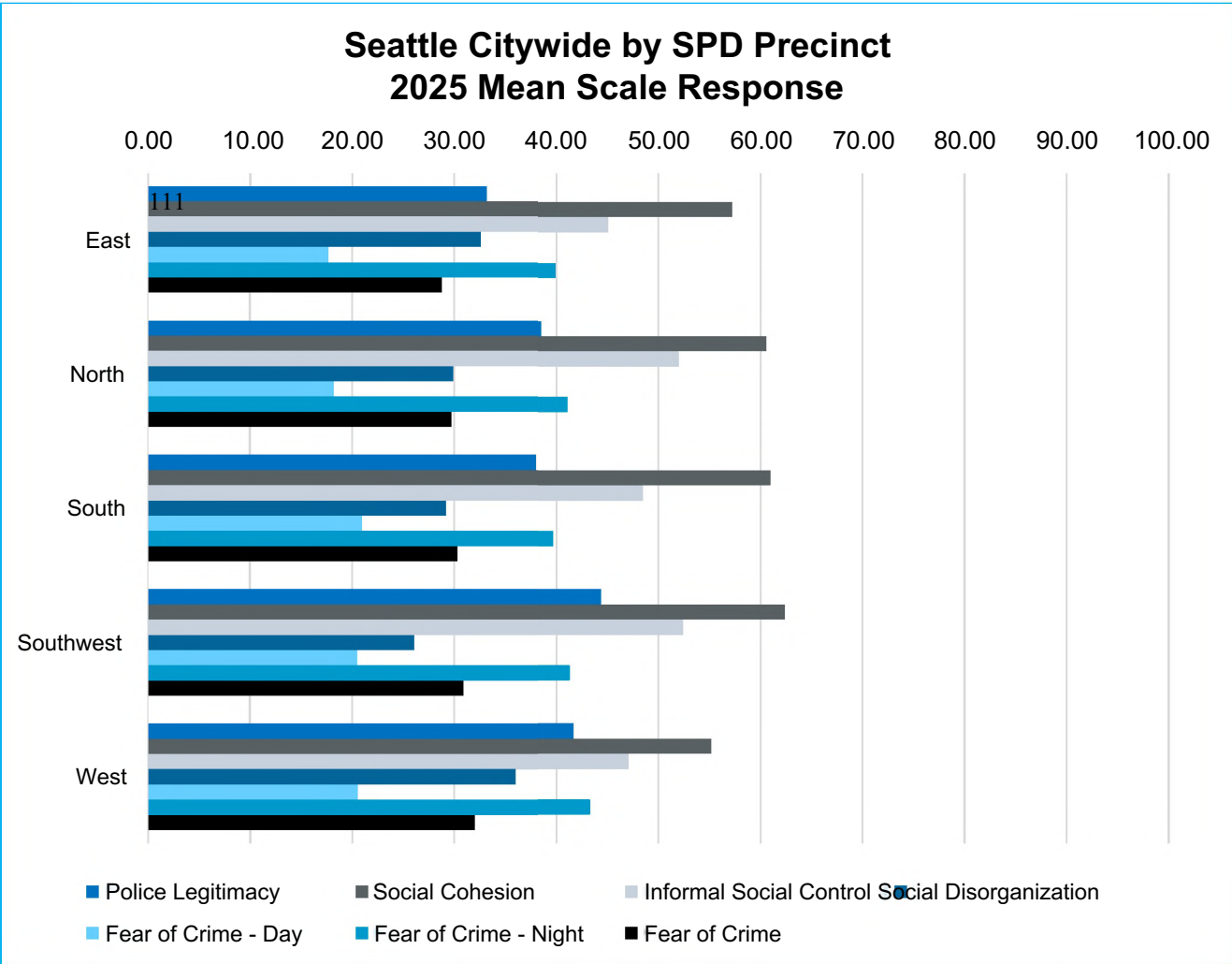
38.8 on this scale item. The Southwest precinct average scale rating for Social Cohesion is 62.8, which is 6.2 points higher than the Citywide average of 59.2. The Southwest average scale rating for Informal Social Control is 53.2 which is 3.9 points higher than the Citywide average scale rating of 49.3. The findings on the scale items for Southwest Precinct show that the average scale rating for Social Disorganization is 25.5, which is 9.3 points lower than the Citywide average scale rating of 35.1. The Fear of Crime – Day average scale rating for the Southwest Precinct of 21.1 is 2.5 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 19.2. The Fear of Crime – Night average scale rating for the Southwest Precinct of 41.7 is 0.6 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 44.1. Lastly, the Fear of Crime average scale rating for the Southwest Precinct of 31.7 is 5 points lower than the Citywide average rating of 36.7. On the item asking respondents to rate their views of SPD versus police nationwide, the findings for the Southwest Precinct show that the rating of SPD specifically of 45.624 which was 3.543 points higher than the Citywide rating of 41.624. The Southwest rating of police in the United States generally was 50.77 which is 4.676 points higher than the Citywide rating of 46.676 for the United States generally.

The top public safety concerns for the West Precinct are Community Capacity, Traffic Safety, Public Order Crime, Homelessness, Property Crime. These concerns are like the top public safety concerns Citywide which were Traffic Safety, Community Capacity, Police Capacity, Property Crime, and Homelessness. While they share most of the same concerns, for residents in the West Precinct concerns surrounding Public Order Crime were greater than Police Capacity. The most prominent themes residents in the West Precinct commented on in their narrative responses are Police Capacity, Traffic Safety, Public Order Crime, Laws/Policy/Accountability, and Drug Activity. At the micro-community level, top public safety concerns, prominent themes, and perceptions of public safety are quite similar from the precinct. Community Capacity is listed as the top concern in the West Precinct, as is listed as the top concern in Belltown, Downtown, and Queen Anne.

The results on the scales measuring community perceptions of public safety also suggest that the West Precinct shows similarity to the scale results citywide with scale ratings of low-moderate (41.7) Police Legitimacy, moderate (55.1) Social Cohesion, moderate (47) Informal Social Control, low-moderate (36) Social Disorganization, and low-moderate (31.9) Fear of Crime (20.6-Day, 43.2-Night). The findings on the scale items for West Precinct show that the average scale rating for West Precinct on Police Legitimacy of 41.7 is 2.9 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 38.8 on this scale item. The West precinct average scale rating for Social Cohesion is 55.1 which is 4.1 points lower than the Citywide average of 59.2. The West average scale rating for Informal Social Control is 47 which is 2.3 points lower than the Citywide average scale rating of 49.3. The findings on the scale items for West Precinct show that the average scale rating for Social Disorganization is 36, which is 0.9 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 35.1 on this scale item. The Fear of Crime – Day average scale rating for the West Precinct of 20.6 is 1.4 points higher than the Citywide average rating of 19.2. The Fear of Crime – Night average scale rating for the West Precinct of 43.2 is 2.1 higher points than the Citywide average rating of 41.1. Lastly, the Fear of Crime average scale rating for the West Precinct of 31.9 is 4.8 points lower than the Citywide average rating of 36.7. On the item asking respondents to rate their views of SPD versus police nationwide, the findings for the West Precinct show that the rating for Seattle Specifically of 48.3 is 6.7 points higher than the Citywide rating of 41.6 for Seattle specifically and 0.3 points higher than the Citywide rating of 46.1 for the United States generally.

2025 Seattle Public Safety Survey Results

The Seattle Public Safety Survey results offer a picture of the public safety concerns of residents of Seattle at the city, precinct, and micro-community levels. At the micro-community level, results differ by precinct and micro-community reflecting heterogeneous micro-communities on measures of community perception of public safety within the precinct. The scale data can be used in conjunction with the top concerns and prominent themes to better understand the nature of communities and micro-communities and their unique public safety issues. Concerns of residents within any given micro-community may differ in terms of perceptions of public safety with respect to Police Legitimacy, Informal Social Control, Social Cohesion, Fear of Crime, and Social Disorganization. The survey findings on the top concerns, most prominent themes, and scale ratings of features of the community that impact public safety can be used at the Citywide, precinct, and micro-community levels to inform and guide law enforcement in developing priorities and to guide strategies in response to distinct community concerns. The results provide an annual snapshot of the nature of perceptions of public safety citywide, by precinct, and by micro-community. Ideally, a healthy community with positive police-community engagement will have high Police Legitimacy, low Social Disorganization, high Informal Social Control, high Social Cohesion, low Fear of Crime, and positive perception and high knowledge of the SPD MCPP initiative. Survey findings can assist communities to target areas of improvement with respect to areas that stray from the ideal and negatively impact public safety.



## Implications for Seattle Micro-Community Policing Plans

The quantitative survey findings of the top public safety concerns, prominent themes identified in the narrative comments, and community perceptions regarding issues related to public safety offer comprehensive information based on survey findings from 8,957 respondents who live and/or work in Seattle. The information can be used to inform and guide the SPD MCPP priorities to ensure that resident concerns are considered in the development and evolution of the Seattle Police Department's MCPPs for the city of Seattle, SPD Precinct, and Precinct micro-communities.

The survey findings can be used to assist SPD, community leaders, and residents to better understand the distinct concerns and perceptions of public safety of residents within micro-communities and the nature of the community and distinct neighborhoods. Concerns of residents within any given community differ with respect to concerns about crime and public safety and perceptions of public safety as measured by the survey scales in terms of concerns about crime and public safety and perceptions of public safety with respect to police legitimacy, social cohesion, informal social control, and fear of crime. The survey findings at the community and micro-community levels can be used to inform and guide law the Seattle Police Department in developing SPD MCPP priorities at the community and micro-community levels and to guide strategies in response to distinct community concerns.

The top public safety concerns coupled with the most prominent themes for the precinct and for each micro-community inform the SPD MCPP priorities to reflect the timely concerns of residents. Survey findings can assist SPD at the city, precinct, and micro-community levels to target areas of for improvement with respect to scale items that reflect resident perceptions of community public safety areas that stray from the ideal and negatively impact public safety. The community perceptions regarding public safety as measured through the survey instrument provides a snapshot of resident concerns about public safety and views on police legitimacy, social disorganization, informal social control, social cohesion, fear of crime across the city, in each SPD Precinct, and individual micro-community. Ideally, a healthy community with positive police-community relations will have high police legitimacy, low social disorganization, high informal social control and social cohesion, and low fear of crime. Survey findings can assist SPD, the city of Seattle, and micro-communities to target areas of improvement with respect to scale items that reflect resident perceptions of community public safety areas that stray from the ideal and negatively impact public safety.
