

Continuing Education Event Social Media and Crime



Featuring Dr. Mary Ellen O'Toole & Dr. Ray Surette




Mary Ellen O'Toole, Ph.D., editor of the journal, *Violence and Gender*, has spent her career studying the criminal mind. One of

the most senior profilers for the FBI until her retirement in 2009, Dr. O'Toole has helped capture, interview and understand some of the world's most infamous people including: Gary Ridgway, the Green River Killer; Ted Kaczynski, the Unabomber; The Zodiac serial murder case; The bombing during the 2002 Olympics in Salt Lake City, UT. Dr. O'Toole has published numerous articles and book chapters on psychopathy, criminal profiling, and social media and crime, and is author of the widely cited report *The School Shooter: A Threat Assessment Perspective*.



Ray Surette, Ph.D. is a Professor of Criminal Justice at the University of Central Florida. He's published several books and

articles including the leading textbook, *Media, Crime, and Justice*. He is author of the seminal article in *Crime & Delinquency*, *Self-Reported Copycat Crime among a Population of Serious and Violent Offenders* and his recent work focuses on performance crime and justice. He is co-principal investigator on a NIJ grant entitled "Studying the Impact of Video Analytics for Pre, Live and Post Event Analysis on Outcomes of Criminal Justice."
