Limited Submission Funding Opportunities

Seattle University requires an internal review and selection process for any funding opportunity that limits the number of applications, nominations, or proposals that an institution is eligible to submit to a sponsor (referred to as "limited submissions"). Please review the <u>Limited Submission Process</u> for full details and find <u>upcoming limited submission opportunities</u>.

New Limited Submission Opportunity – National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) Summer Stipend: All tenure-track or tenured faculty in humanistic fields are eligible to be nominated by SU for the NEH Summer Stipend Program, which provides \$6,000 stipends to support faculty in developing scholarly products over the summer. Two nominees are allowed per institution. Prospective nominees must notify OSP of their intent to apply by June 15, 2023, with an internal application deadline of July 5, 2023. More details about SU's nomination process for the NEH summer stipends is available on the Limited Submission Opportunities webpage. Note that non-tenure track faculty are also eligible to submit to the NEH Summer Stipend program as independent scholars outside of SU's limited submission process. While the *Reignited Strategic Directions (RSD)* have been the focal point across campus over the past year, major funders are also taking notice. In just the first year of implementation, faculty leaders in the

Office of the Provost and the College of Arts and Sciences have received nearly \$1.4M between two awards in supporting curriculum and course redesign, aligned with RSD Goal 1 - *Reimagine and Revise the Curriculum*.

Congratulations to the Office of the Provost for securing a \$871,000 award from the M.J. Murdock Charitable Trust! The implementation of the award, led by Dr. Charles Tung and John Fleming, provides the necessary time for the Provost Fellows and other faculty leaders across campus to do the deep, time-intensive work of revising curriculum to meet the current challenges in our society as articulated in the RSD. This spring, academic departments and programs will have the opportunity to apply to receive support to coordinate and facilitate the work of *Reimagine and Revise the Curriculum* within their programs. Congratulations to an interdisciplinary team in the College of Arts and Sciences, led by Drs. Charles Tung, Hazel Hahn, and Maria Bullon-Fernandez for securing a \$495,000 award from the Mellon Foundation – one of just 26 in their Higher Education inaugural open call - for their project "Race, Racialization, and Resistance in the United States." Faculty from across the humanities and humanistic social sciences will have the opportunity to collaboratively develop courses in numerous departments and programs that embed and explore the role of race, racialization, and forms of resistance to racism in the US and beyond. Faculty from across the humanities and humanistic social sciences will have the opportunity to collaboratively develop an integrative curriculum, embedding and exploring the role of race, racialization, and forms of resistance to racism in the US. The grant will fund faculty stipends for new course development and the revision of current courses as well as provide professional development funds for departments and faculty looking to learn more about these topics. SU Policy Updates

Reminder: CITI Training Required for Student Research Assistants

A reminder to SU investigators to please ensure that all personnel working on your research team – students, staff and faculty – are up-to-date on their Responsible Conduct of Research (RCR) Training. RCR training is required for all NSF and NIH personnel and strongly encouraged for all other researchers to uphold SU's commitment to responsible and ethical research. This training should be completed at least every four years. More information and to access the CITI Training Modules is available here.

New Proposal Transmittal Form

The Proposal Transmittal Form (PTF), <u>required for all proposals</u> submitted through SU, has recently been updated to reflect new compliance requirements from the NSF, clearly identify key information for all reviewers, and streamline our proposal forms by incorporating the financial conflict of interest form. New addendums include Addendum F - Off-campus Indirect Rate Certification and the NSF Off-campus Safety Plan. You can find the updated PTF and related addendums on our website <u>here</u>. New Sub-Award and Sub-Contract Webpage

Seattle University sponsored projects are becoming more and more collaborative! As such, we've developed a new webpage – <u>Subawards and Contracts</u> – to provide guidance to investigators and budget managers who are preparing to issue subawards and subcontracts to collaborators. Revised Sponsored Projects Expenditures Guide

In light of the recent Accounts Payables transition to <u>Chrome River</u> for reimbursements and ProCard reporting, the <u>Sponsored Projects Expenditure Guide</u> has been updated. Sponsor Policy Updates and Resources

National Science Foundation (NSF)

NSF Off-Campus Research Safety Plan now required: The 2023 NSF Proposal and Award Policies and Procedures Guide (PAPPG) now requires certification at the time of proposal submission of safe and inclusive working environments for all off-campus or off-site research. This means a Research Safety Plan must be developed prior to any proposal submission which includes research being conducted off-campus (where research is defined as data/information/samples being collected off-campus or off-site, such as fieldwork and research activities on vessels and aircraft. NSF CAREER webinar: Faculty interested in pursuing the <u>NSF Faculty Early Career (CAREER) program</u> are encouraged to take advantage of a recent webinar by Hanover Consulting, which specifically focuses on the educational activities and broader impacts aspects of CAREER proposal development and writing (<u>recording</u> and <u>slides</u> available).

National Institutes of Health (NIH)

Data Management & Sharing Plan now required: For all proposals submitted on or after January 25, 2023, a Data Management and Sharing Plan must be completed and submitted to the NIH. NIH R-series Funding Opportunities: A recent webinar by Hanover Consulting may be of interest to investigators considering pursuing funding through NIH Research Grants (R-Series) programs, including R15 (Research Enhancement Awards), R01 (Research Project Grant Program), R03 (Small Grant Program), and R21 (Exploratory/Developmental Research Grant Award).
