Inbound Exchange students can take courses from across majors/disciplines. You will work with your Seattle University Academic Advisor on your course preferences and registration. Note: Courses from the School of Law, Graduate courses, and certain Undergraduate Programs (Diagnostic Ultrasound, Matteo Ricci Institute, Nursing, University Honors, and New and Continuing Studies) are not available. Please note that some of the courses are only offered in particular quarters and/or have pre-requisite requirements.

Transcript	Students will have to submit a request for their Seattle University transcript to be sent to their home university. Transcripts are issued by the Registrar's Office and should be requested once grades are posted, approximately one week after finals. Transcripts are available in Electronic and Printed via the Office of The Registrar (https://www.seattleu.edu/office-of-the-registrar/transcripts/). We recommend that students request several physical copies for their own record for future use.

Housing	
On-Campus Housing	https://www.seattleu.edu/life-at-seattle-u/housing-dining/ Exchange Students are required to stay in On-Campus housing. Residence hall housing options include single, double, triple rooms, apartment style living, and intentional living communities. Prices vary greatly according to housing options and amenities Application Housing and Residence Life housing applications open the following dates: - Fall – April 1st - Winter – mid Nov - Spring – mid Feb All rooms in the traditional residence halls have one twin XL bed, wardrobe, desk and chair per student in the living space. There is also a sink and mirror in the room along with a microwave/mini-refrigerator combination. Each individual residence hall may have other amenities that are listed on the specific building page in the Residences section. Linens are not included.

	Exchange students are only granted exemption from this policy with a formal written request. As the experience of studying abroad can be short, the full immersion into the US university system/Seattle University is the purpose of the experience.
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Off-Campus Housing

The only acceptable Off-Campus housing which are privately owned and managed property for Seattle U students are The Douglas and Vi Hilbert Residence Hall, which are located adjacent to campus. However, both options require applicants to sign a 12-month lease. It would be the student's responsibility to find a sub-leaser for the months they are not in Seattle.

Visa/Immigration		
Visa for the USA	International students are required to obtain a J-1 visa to study at Seattle University. After submitting the exchange application, students will be assigned a SEVIS ID number. This information will be included in the student's admissions email. Students can then make an appointment with the US Embassy (www.usembassy.gov) and pay the SEVIS fee (www.fmjfee.com). Students must present proof of SEVIS payment during their visa interview. Please contact the local US Embassy or Consulate to check the documents required for visa application. The waiting time for an interview appointment for applicants can vary, so students are strongly encouraged to schedule their interview appointment as soon as they receive their acceptance packet from Seattle University.	
Check-in & Travel Signature	Upon arrival, all J-1 Visa holders must visit the International Student & Scholar Center (Pavilion 160) on Seattle University Campus with their ORIGINAL Form DS-2019 and passport. The Responsible Officer (RO) will provide an immigration orientation and sign their Form DS-2019.
