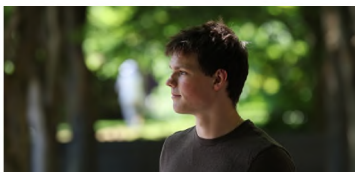

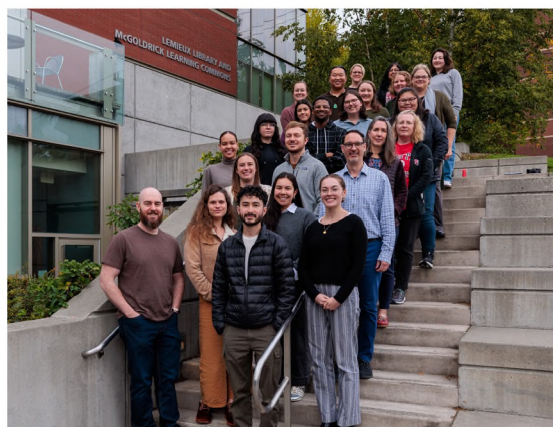
WHO IS MY ACADEMIC ADVISOR?

Complete Your Housing Plan

Submit Meningitis Agreement

Washington state law requires that information on meningococcal disease must be provided to every student prior to class registration.

Submit Final College Transcripts Showing Graduation Date

We need your official college transcript on file as confirmation that you have completed your prior college credits. Submit your transcript by following the instructions in your [Admissions Portal](#).

Upload Your Campus Card Photo

All Redhawks are provided a Campus Card photo ID that gives you access to printing, your meal plan and buildings including the library, gym and residential communities. You will receive your Campus Card in September.

Orientation Modules

Complete 'Voices for Change' Modules

Schedule an Appointment with Your Academic Advisor

During your appointment, you will review your course schedule with your Academic Advisor, discuss your academic and career goals and explore insights on how to make the most of your time at Seattle University.

Submit Immunization Records

Prior to arrival on campus or attending classes, undergraduate students are required to provide proof of immunity to measles. Find more details about immunizations [here](#) and submit your information via our [Online Student Health Immunization Form](#).

Request Accommodations for a Disability (if applicable)

Students who are requesting academic, housing and meal plan accommodations for the first time at Seattle University are required to complete the New Student Application and meet with a staff member before receiving services.

Plan to Register to Vote (optional)

For many new students, this fall may be your first election in which you are eligible to vote. We encourage you to register to vote before you start classes, as absentee ballot timelines and voter registration deadlines vary across states.

RSVP for Transfer Student Orientation

Transfer Student Orientation is a required, in-person experience for new transfer students to join us on campus to learn about essential campus resources and find your flock of new friends. Students are encouraged to have their parents, family and supporters sign up to attend as well. This event is designed to help you be prepared to start classes in the fall.

WHAT IS TRANSFER STUDENT ORIENTATION?

Transfer Student Orientation is a one-day experience for you and up to two guests to join us on campus in August to learn about essential campus resources and find new friends.

WHEN IS TRANSFER STUDENT ORIENTATION?

Transfer Student Orientation takes place on Wednesday, August 12. Overnight housing is not provided. Please do not finalize travel plans to attend before you receive confirmation of your RSVP.

WHAT HAPPENS AT TRANSFER STUDENT ORIENTATION?

Students will connect with other transfer students, explore transfer-specific resources, engage with academic and student engagement leaders on campus and participate in workshops focused on navigating the realities of transferring to Seattle University.

Guest sessions are designed to equip a student's closest supporters with the knowledge and context they need to support students throughout their transition to Seattle U.

HOW DO I SIGN UP FOR TRANSFER STUDENT ORIENTATION?

Students: Log into your Orientation Portal and click on the "Orientation Events" tab.

There is no fee to attend Transfer Student Orientation. The cost of this program is included in the Orientation Fee that is part of your first term bill.

Parents/Guests: After students sign up to attend Redhawk Launch, they can add up to 2 guests to their RSVP..

IMMERSIONS

WHAT ARE EARLY BIRD IMMERSIONS?

Early Bird Immersions are optional early arrival programs that offer new students the opportunity to come to campus a few days before Fall Welcome and connect with other new students who share their passions and interests. Each experience focuses on a different theme, such as outdoor adventure, community service, identity exploration and academic success.

WHY SHOULD I SIGN UP FOR AN EARLY BIRD IMMERSION?

Participating in an early arrival program is an opportunity to make new friends with similar interests, move into your residence hall early (if living on-campus) and get settled into life at Seattle University a few days before the start of Fall Welcome.

IS THERE A COST FOR EARLY BIRD IMMERSIONS?

Some programs have a fee and others have no cost. Program fees cover the cost of meals and program supplies and activities. Some programs offer scholarship requests for financial assistance. Some programs with fees also have a half or full scholarship request for financial support.

HOW DO I SIGN UP FOR AN EARLY BIRD IMMERSION?

In early June you will be able to sign up for an Early Bird Immersion in your Orientation Portal.

HOW WILL MY MOVE-IN BE DIFFERENT?

Students living in on-campus residence halls will be approved to move in early for their immersion program. Your move-in date and time will depend on which immersion you sign up for. Early move-in dates and times will be noted on the sign-up form for each immersion. After your attendance is confirmed, detailed move-in instructions will be emailed to your Seattle University email in August. Students attending an immersion program will not need to request an early arrival date in the Housing Portal. There is no additional cost for early move-in.



2026 IMMERSIONS

All Early Bird Immersions take place **Wednesday, September 16–Thursday, September 17**, with an Early Arrival Move-In date of Tuesday, September 15, unless otherwise noted.

BUILDING COMMUNITY!

Host: College of Nursing and Health Sciences

Join nursing advisors, faculty and current students at the Clinical Performance Lab to learn more about the College of Nursing and Health Sciences. Students will be able to watch a nursing simulation, learn a nursing assessment skill, meet with current students and learn more about their upcoming program of study.

CENTRAL SEATTLE WALKING TOUR

Host: Sundborg Center for Community Engagement (CCE) and University Ministry

Part-pilgrimage, part-immersion, part-retreat. Gather with fellow new Redhawks and campus leaders on a walking tour of our local neighborhoods and community partners in Seattle University's backyard. Learn about local social justice issues, explore opportunities to make a positive impact on your new community, deepen your understanding of community engagement and reflect on a commitment to justice in the Jesuit tradition.

CLP+ is an immersive experience designed to support new students of color to develop a community on campus, learn about opportunities for engagement and resources that can support their success and develop leadership skills as they transition into college. You'll examine personal values while exploring concepts around social justice and finding strategies to navigate these systems. CLP+ begins as a pre-fall immersion program and continues throughout the fall quarter with regular touchpoints with staff and peer mentors.

FIRST@SU

Host: Center for First-Gen Success

First@SU is a two day experience where you'll bond with fellow first-gen Redhawks and get the lowdown on how to thrive at SU. You'll connect with faculty mentors, explore your identity and strengths and get an inside scoop on academic expectations, campus resources, college success tips and what to expect when classes kick off. Join the Center for First-Gen Success for a chance to start strong, feel seen and step into your first year with clarity and momentum.

LEAP: LAUNCHING EXCELLENCE IN ACADEMIC PURSUITS IN SCIENCE AND ENGINEERING

Host: College of Science and Engineering

LEAP into the school year with a community of fellow scientists and engineers. Cultivate connections with science and engineering students and faculty, participate in social and investigative activities on campus, experience the local neighborhoods and learn approaches for succeeding academically. All this while also developing social networks and pursuing future exploration in our disciplines across campus.

SEATTLE ART, HISTORY AND CULTURE STROLL

Host: College of Arts and Sciences

This immersive welcome experience invites students to explore the people, places and stories that shape the neighborhoods surrounding Seattle University through the interdisciplinary lenses of the social sciences and liberal arts. Through guided walks and curated stops, participants will encounter a mix of art, food, music and history, from spaces like the Hedreen Gallery and the Chapel of St. Ignatius, to off-campus visits that highlight Seattle's layered cultural identities. Whether reflecting on local landmarks or sampling neighborhood favorites, students will begin building a shared sense of connection and belonging as they prepare to launch their academic journey.

A TASTE OF BUSINESS: THE STORY OF ALBERS ENTREPRENEURS IN THE RESTAURANT SCENE

Host: Albers School of Business and Economics

The Albers School of Business and Economics has a rich tradition of business leaders and innovators in the Seattle area, including the city's delicious restaurant scene. This immersion program is designed to introduce new students to this tradition. Begin building your network by connecting with your fellow new classmates in an engaging (and delicious!) day designed to introduce you to restaurants in the Seattle area that are owned and/or founded by Albers alumni. You will also get to meet your Albers New Student Mentors, faculty and staff.

ROOTS & ROUTES

Host: UREC (University Recreation) and University Ministry

Dates: Sunday, September 13–Thursday, September 17 (Early Move-In available September 11–12)

Find and build your SU community over five days and four nights on the shore of Lake Crescent in Olympic National Park. Spend your days hiking, biking and canoeing and your evenings engaging in fun activities. All programming is beginner-friendly and previous outdoor experience is not required. In the evenings, we will reflect on the start of your college experience and discuss different possibilities for connecting with your new SU community. Transport, food, lodging and activities are all included in the cost of the program.

UREC HIKING TRIPS

We will meet on campus, then drive out to a small rocky bluff that is a moderately graded 3.7 mile trail with a gain of 1,300 feet. Although relatively steep inclines bookend this hike, this primarily north-to-south route is perfect for beginners. Join fellow new Redhawks and campus leaders from UREC on a one-day hike at this 4.3-mile out-and-back trail! Get a workout and experience rock work completed by the Department of Natural Resources and Washington Trails Association volunteer crews on this hike. Your reward is a rocky overlook from which you can marvel at Mount Kent, McClellan Butte and Mount Washington, the behemoths forming the south rim of the west entrance to Snoqualmie Pass.

Chapel: Chapel of St. Ignatius.

ConnectSU: An [online platform](#) where you can learn about clubs/organizations to join and events happening at SU.

[The Core/UCOR:](#) A multidiscipline curriculum for all students, in addition to their major.

CSI: Center for Student Involvement, supports student activities, government, clubs and organizations.

DA: Desk assistant at one of the residence hall desks.

DPS: Department of Public Safety, available for support on campus 24/7.

FH: First Hill, often referring to our campus

HAWC: Health and Wellness Crew: Wellness peer educators.

Homecoming: A campus-wide celebration packed with a series of events and programs for all Redhawks to enjoy.

Hub Desk: The information desk on the first floor of the Student Center.

ISSC: International Student and Scholar Center, located in Pigott Pavilion.

KXSU: Seattle University’s student-run radio station.

Links: “Home away from home” spaces that provide welcoming environments to support the day-to-day needs of our various student populations. Explore study spaces, kitchenettes, access to campus resources, computers and printers.

MCC: Main Campus Center, the primary building for classrooms, dining, resources and services at South Lake Union (Cornish).

[mySeattleU](#): Student online access to academic records, registration, financial aid, bills and student employment.

Nellie’s: Nellie’s Cafe & Espresso Bar, the South Lake Union dining hall located in the MCC.

NSR: New Student Retreat, off-campus retreat tradition to reflect on hopes for your journey at SU.

Office Hours: An opportunity to talk with your professors to discuss questions you may have about your class or other related topics (usually announced in class and in your syllabus).

OL: Orientation Leader, a peer leader who helps new students transition to university life.

ORCA Card: Transportation card used across systems in the Seattle area.

Quad: Short for “quadrangle,” located in the heart of campus and home to our fountain.

Quadstock: Annual spring music festival sponsored by SEAC.

RA: Resident Assistant, student staff member on residence hall floors who helps build community.

Redhawk Center: The campus athletic and recreation complex.

Redhawk Service Center: Co-located resources of the Registrar’s Office and Student Financial Services in Vi Hilbert Hall.

RCC: Residential Community Coordinator. Full-time, live-in professional staff member in the residence hall.

Rudy the Redhawk: Seattle University mascot.

SEAC: Student Events and Activities Council. A student programming body on campus. Plans large scale signature programs and off-campus excursions.

Search: A retreat by University Ministry focused on self-discovery in the context of community.

SGSU: Student Government of Seattle University.

SLU: South Lake Union, often referring to our Cornish campus.

Upper/Lower Mall: The main North/South walking thoroughfares through campus.

UREC: University Recreation: Intramural Sports, sport clubs, workout space/group fitness classes, aquatics facility/lessons and outdoor activities.

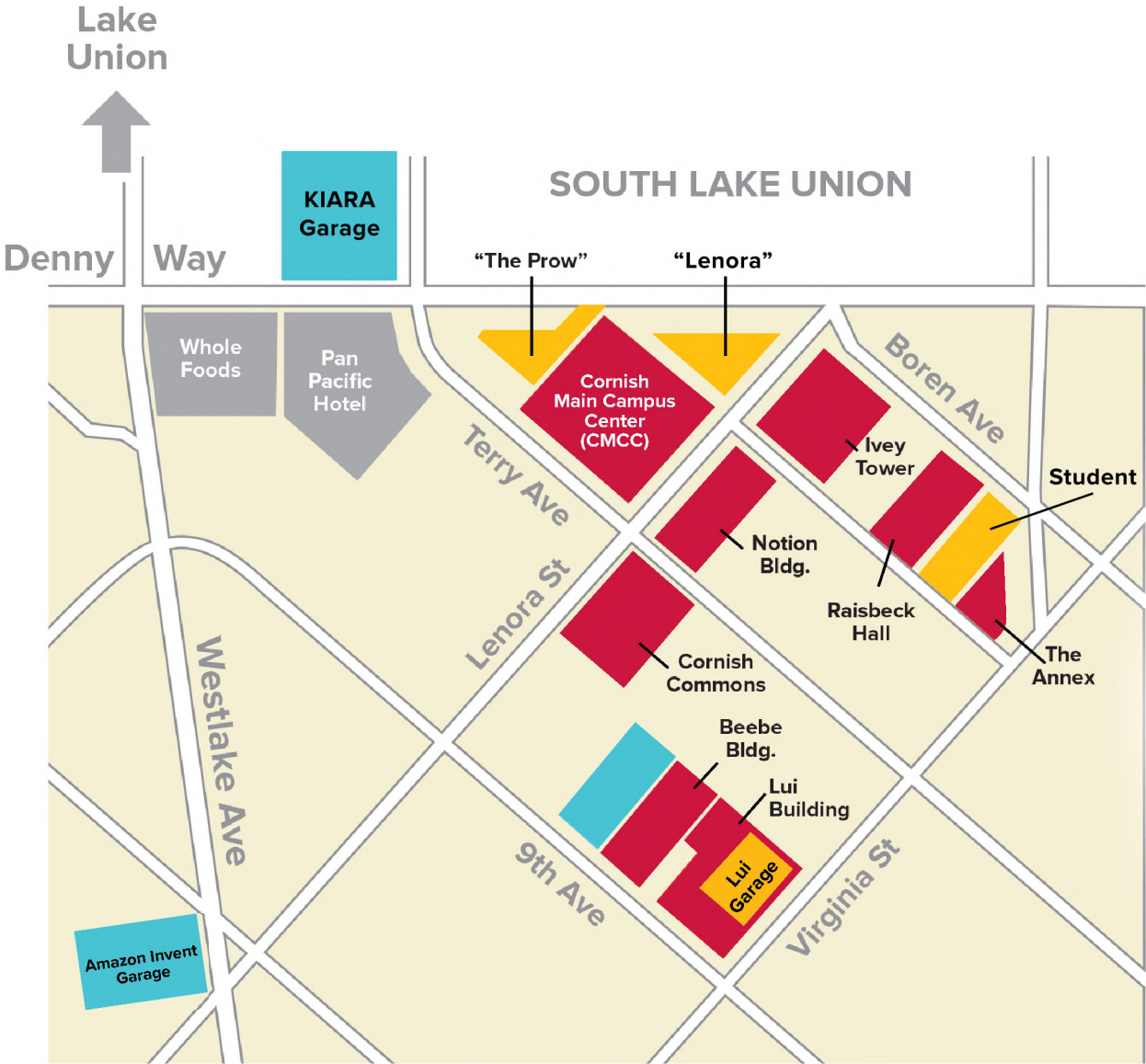
