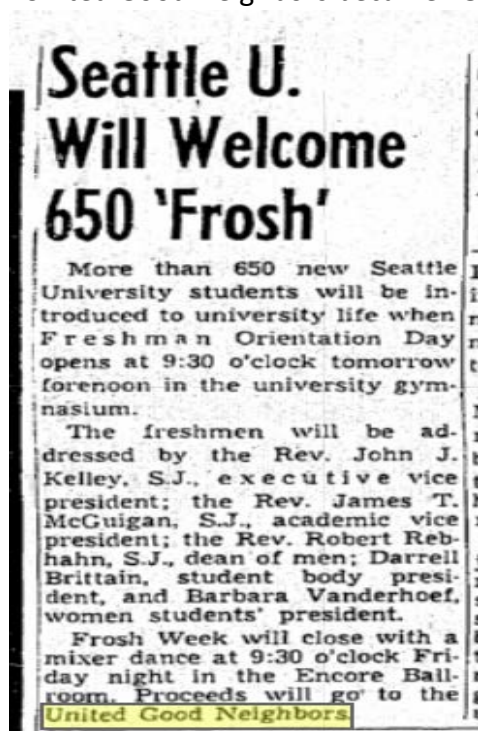


Seattle U and United Way Partnership

According to several articles in the Seattle Times Archives online researched by United Way, Seattle U has established partnership with the United Way dating back 1954 or even earlier.

United Way Timeline

Established in 1921, the **“Seattle Community Fund”** was the first federated community fundraising organization in Seattle. This effort expanded to include national agencies and in 1952 Seattle Community Fund was re-named **“United Good Neighbors (UGN)”**. In 1972 United Good Neighbors became **“United Way of King County (UWKC)”**.

Seattle U. Tops Quota For U. G. N.

Seattle University students and faculty members have contributed \$1,920 — 2 per cent above their quota — in the United Good Neighbors fund drive, the Very Rev. A. A. Lemieux, education-division chairman, said today.

J. W. McLelland headed the Seattle University drive.

The University of Washington faculty drive, led by Dr. Julius A. Roller, has reached its quota of \$26,945. Student solicitation will follow.

The division has collected 91 per cent of its \$87,320 quota.

Other division sections, their leaders and percentages of quotas raised are:

Seattle Public Schools, William Haines and Earl Burgett, 97 per cent; private schools, with leaders in each school, 92 per cent; Catholic parochial schools, the Rev. Philip H. Duffy, 82 per cent; Seattle Pacific College, Miss Winifred Weter, 67.5 per cent, and suburban schools, with leaders in each district, 54.5 per cent.

The over-all Good Neighbors drive has raised \$3,413,736, or 94 per cent of the \$3,647,598 goal.

United Way leaders

Two persons have been named to key positions in the **United Way** of King County 1972 fund-raising drive in the fall. Jack Lovejoy will head the metropolitan division, which solicits businesses of 25 employees or fewer. The Very Rev. Louis Gaffney, president of **Seattle University** will head the education division, which solicits teacher, professors and school district employees. The goal for this year's drive, to begin September 14, is \$7,935,468 for 80 health and welfare agencies.

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Two men named to top positions in **United Way** drive

The Rev. William J. Sullivan, S.J., and James A. Thorpe have been named to top volunteer positions with the 1982 **United Way** fund appeal.

Sullivan is president of Seattle University. Thorpe is chairman of the board and chief executive officer of Washington Natural Gas Co.

They are associate general chairmen of the public-services and special-gifts divisions, respectively.

Both are responsible for recruiting a volunteer team and organizing the solicitation of contributions for their divisions.

The appointments were announced by Samuel N. Stroun, general campaign chairman for the 1982 **United Way** fund appeal. Last year's appeal raised \$20,805,807.
